GEORGE MACLEOD, Esq., Cashier of the Union Bank, and wife, arrived at Halifax this morning just in time to be too late to catch the train for the Island. They purpose coming home on Wednesday.

Snow fell to the depth of four and a half inches yesterday. This was the heaviest snow fall so far. There is pretty good sleighing in the city, and those who can afford the luxury are having a merry sleigh ride.

A NUMBER of citizens complain that the Waiting Room on Steam Navigation Wharf has been closed against them and that they are compelled to stand on the wharf these cold nights to await arrival of the steamer. This being the case, the directors of the Company should remedy the matter.

THE RIFLE.—The challenge match, between the rifle team which recently came to Charlottetown, P. E. I., under the command of Capt. Curran, H. G. A., and another team under command Major Walsh, 93rd, took place at Bedford on the 16th and resulted in a victory for the former, the scores being 521 against 497, which shows the shooting not to have equalled that at Charlottetown. The best individual score was that of Capt. Bishop, 63 out of a possible 70.

On Thursday last a lunatic named Morrison escaped from Falconwood Asylum, and during Thursday night entered the residence of Major Dogherty through a back window. When discovered by the Major in a room, where he had securely locked himself up, he refused to leave. But the police were sent for and Morrison was by them taken back to the asylum. It would be well if the keepers of the asylum would be more watchful over such lunatics as Morrison, who frequently escape and visit private residences in the city. They may be harmless; but their sudden appearance in the midst of a private family is to be deprecated.

HORSE KILLED AND WAGON SMASHED.—Quite a serious accident happened to the Rev. Mr. Kinley, Baptist Minister, at East Point, on Wednesday evening last. He had been to Souris, and was on his way homeward about eleven o'clock. The night being dark, and not being very well acquainted with the road, his horse went too close to the abutment of the bridge at the foot of McMahon's hill, tumbled over, taking wagon and driver with him. Mr. Kinley was stunned by the fall, but otherwise received no serious injury. The wagon was badly smashed up. The horse, after struggling a while, freed himself and started in the direction of home; but, after going a short distance, staggered and fell dead on the roadside. Mr. Kinley was able to walk home—a distance of five miles—and, we are happy to say, has quite recovered from the shock. The horse and wagon belonged to Capt. James Stewart, West River.

THE JUBILEE.—Last week Rev. Father McGillivray, of Charlottetown, gave a jubilee to St. Dunstan's Congregation. During the retreat, twenty-one masses were celebrated, seven benedictions were given, and Father McGillivray preached sixteen sermons. The number that partook of the benefits of the jubilee was extraordinarily large, and we feel safe in saying that the morning and evening services at St. Dunstan's were never before so well attended. The number who received holy communion must have been upwards of two thousand eight hundred. All seemed to enter into the solemnity, with a true spirit of religion, desirous to do what their zealous pastor directed. At the closing services last evening, the Cathedral was uncrowdedly crowded. Each member of the congregation renewed his or her baptismal vows, and Father McGillivray, appearing as fresh as at the beginning of the retreat, delivered his most impressive discourse on "Heaven—Its Joys." We congratulate the members of St. Dunstan's on having a truly energetic and zealous pastor.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

HALIFAX, Nov. 18.

A despatch received to-day from Acapulco, Mexico, dated 17th inst., from Captain Neil Currie, of the barque Lara, of Maitland, states that his vessel had been burned at sea, Oct. 23rd, in lat. 11 N., lon. 110 W. The long boat, with the captain and nine men, arrived at Acapulco, and two of the ship's boats, with the remainder of the crew are missing. The Lara left Hull, Eng., for San Francisco, with a cargo of coal and put into Rio Janeiro, July 23rd, in distress, where she repaired and sailed for destination. She was 948 tons register, built at Maitland in 1872, and was owned by the estate of J. Northrup & Sons, of Halifax. The vessel is insured for \$30,000 in Halifax office, and freight probably elsewhere.

Sch. Lord Bury, Capt. Perrier, of Desconusse, which sailed hence three weeks ago for Port Hawkesbury, has not yet arrived there, and it is feared that she has been lost with all hands. Two sons of Capt. Perrier were on board.

A melancholy accident, resulting in the drowning of three persons—two boys and a man—has occurred at Cheticamp, C. B. A farmer named Frank Roberts, employed by Philip Robin & Co., and living on the island, was over to the "Point" on business with his horse and cart, and left for home in the afternoon accompanied by a lad named LeBlanc. It was Roberts' intention to visit his fatherland (Jersey) shortly, and he called at the house of one Magloir Harris, a near neighbor, to bid him good bye. Having done so, he continued on his way home with young LeBlanc, and was joined by two sons of Harris, named John and Marcelan. On nearing his residence the idea occurred to him to drive out into the water of Eastern Harbor for the purpose of cleaning his cart. In giving effect to this idea, he went out too far and the horse, suddenly plunging into deep water, capsized the cart. Its three occupants, John and Marcelan Harris and Roberts were thrown into the channel and drowned. Young LeBlanc, just before the wagon overturned, had jumped out and reached the shore in safety.
