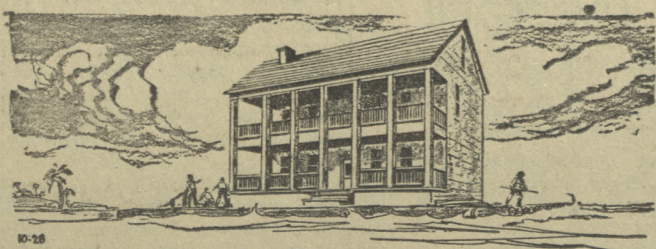
**Reds Use New

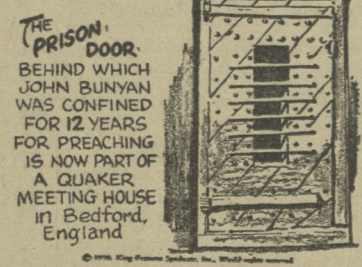
**UK Is Urged To

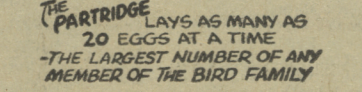

better after the play of the hand than during it, maintained South had played badly, and that the club finesse should never have been taken. He argued that South should have played the A-K of clubs, and if it turned out West had the queen, the contract was still sure to make. West could then be handed his club trick, but with West on lead, the king of spades could not be successfully attacked, and the contract would make. Since the queen of clubs would have dropped on this line of play, South would have made six instead of going down one at four. Of course, as sometimes happens in bridge games, the discussion of the hand was more heated and more vociferous than our brief description indicates, but essentially the facts were as outlined.

North's point was good, and his suggested method of play was clearly better than South's. But in our view, both parties were wrong. Declarer had a sure thing going for him. All he had to do after three rounds of trumps was to lead the king of spades, forcing out the ace, and later lead the ten of spades, forcing out the queen.

This would establish dummy's jack of spades, on which a club could be discarded to insure ten tricks. Bridge is not as complicated as some people make it out to be.

**'Bump' At Springhill Was
Magnitude Of Small Quake**

HALIFAX (CP) — The "bump" or rock burst at Springhill's No. 2 colliery Thursday night was caused by a landslide of softstone rocks and was the magnitude of a small earthquake, Dr. G. C. Cummings, professor of geology at Dalhousie University, said Saturday.

Dr. Cummings explained that the sandstone rock in the Springhill area is very weak. When coal is removed supports are constructed to carry the load. Pressure at that depth is great. Consequently, the softest layers tend to move toward the weaker ground and the roof of the shaft can hold only so much. When too

**Up To Business Man To
Meet Changing Conditions**

OTTAWA (CP) — In a free enterprise economy, the businessman must face the facts of life, however tough on him they may be. He must adapt to changing conditions.

Does that sound hard on the businessman? On him, maybe, but perfectly legitimate as long as the public benefits.

Or, in other words: What's in the public interest is not necessarily always in the interest of all businessmen.

This in effect was the message of the restrictive trade practices commission in its recent report on the wholesale cigarette and confectionery trade in the Edmonton district.

The commission made this point in some general observations about current trends in the
