

**Local and Other Items.**

A POLITICAL meeting will be held at Souris on the 4th of February.

MAILS.—Forty-four bags of mail matter left Cape Tormentine this morning at 8 o'clock; arrived at Cape Traverse at noon, and in this city at 5 o'clock, p. m. The foreign mails left Cape Traverse at 9 o'clock this morning.

EXPORTS IN WINTER.—The "Northern Light" cleared from Georgetown for Pictou on the 28th inst., with 23 cases canned meat, 15 rolls leather, 25 cow hides, 8 bbls. and 1 bbl. sheepskins; and on the 27th she cleared with 80 cases canned meat and 1 cask hides.

THE attendance at the market to-day (Friday) was very fair. Prices were as follows: Beef (small) 5 to 12 cts. per lb.; beef (qr.) from 4 to 7 cts per lb.; mutton, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; lamb, from 4 to 8 cents per lb.; pork (per lb.) from 7 to 9 cents; pork (per carcass) from 5 to 6 cents; geese, from 50 to 60 cents each; ducks, from 25 to 30 cents each; Turkeys, 75 to \$1.25; chickens, from 50 to 75 cents per pair; butter (fresh) from 18 to 24 cents per lb.; butter (tub) from 17 to 20 cent per lb.; potatoes, from 16 to 20 cents per bushel; hay, from 28 to 32 cents per 100 lbs.; oats, 34 to 35 cents; oatmeal, from \$2.25 to \$2.75.

**A Brief Parliamentary Guide.**

(From the King's County Advertiser.)

In a few days hence the members of the Dominion Commons and Senate will be setting out for Ottawa to attend the approaching session of Parliament, and it is in this direction that their constituents must look for such reforms and improvements as come within the jurisdiction of these honorable gentlemen. Under the circumstances, no part of the Dominion can, perhaps, with equal fairness and justice, present a stronger claim to liberal treatment than little Prince Edward Island. To secure equal rights and privileges from this august body, while in session, is a vast undertaking, and requires the utmost vigilance and activity on the part of the handful of men sent up from here to contend with the grand army assembled from ever quarter of the Union. We are still of the number who believe that the reasonable expectations of this Island will yet be fairly dealt with.

Nevertheless, it may not be out of place to take a cursory view of the principal questions which in all probability will present themselves before the session is ended.

Our representatives are to a man committed to whatever measures may be introduced to bring about Reciprocity between Canada and the United States. The latter having recently shown symptoms of uneasiness, heretofore unknown to them, under the provisional tariff put into operation for the protection of the Dominion, many are beginning to hope that our statesmen will have an early opportunity of negotiating with them on this all-important subject. When such a desirable change is already visible, no doubt our neighbors will ere long feel prepared to reciprocate with us on fair and honorable terms. Can the Island's representatives then, we ask, be depended upon safely to support such a policy?

The final settlement of the Fishery Award question is another important matter affecting this Province, and our future weal or woe depends in no small degree upon the decision of the General Government. It behooves our representatives to show unity and determination, otherwise disastrous results may follow. A final solution of this problem is the least we can expect, and we trust that the answer may be a satisfactory one.

Next in importance stands the question of winter steam communication, which has unfortunately, through selfishness or prejudice, divided public opinion to a certain extent for some time past. These barriers are, however, rapidly disappearing, and now that a practical and feasible experiment has met with unexpected success, it devolves upon our representatives to shake hands over their petty differences, and work harmoniously for the common welfare of the people.

In view of the enormous expenditure incurred by the tempest that swept off costly public structures last autumn, and the consequent drain upon the Provincial exchequer, strenuous efforts should be made to obtain grants for every public work that properly belongs to the General Government, in order to assist as far as possible in maintaining the public works of the Province.
