Impaired Driving Guilty Is Pleared

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—Chester Allison MacDonald, 46, of Shamrock, was found guilty on a charge of impaired driving in Prince County Magistrate's court yesterday by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald, who said the case was one of the worst that had ever appeared before him. Sentence was deferred on a charge of impaired driving until Nov. 26.

The accused had pleaded guilty to being impaired while driving a tractor at Shamrock, June 29.

The case had been twice adjourned because the defence counsel, Bruce MacDonald, objected to an oral statement said to have been made by the driver of the alleged incident and written statement said to have been given to a police officer on the grounds that he believed RCMP had taken improper procedure in the case.

Evidence was given by Const. Alan D. Burchell, Borden detachment RCMP, and Joseph A. Hughes, Raymond Hughes, Alan Brennan and Samuel Gillis, all of Shamrock.

Aubrey Bonness, Kensington, pleaded guilty to a charge of impaired driving and was fined \$75 and costs.

Joseph Walter Eric Gallant, Summerside, pleaded not guilty to a charge of breaking and entering People's store, Mt. Carmel, Oct. 20, and will be tried when news from RCMP criminal laboratories, Sackville, N.B., is ready to be presented.

The accused was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary, Oct. 21 for legal possession of two bicycles taken from the Mt. Carmel area, Oct. 20, and fined \$100 for being found guilty to a charge of incest. A date for hearing will be set Nov. 12. Bail was set at \$5,000 with two sureties of \$2,500 each.

New Buildings Along TCH Pose Speed Limit Problem

By DON MACLEOD—A flood of requests that speed limits be established in areas of heavy building concentration is creating problems for the department of highways in connection with the Trans-Canada Highway. Of late there has been a rapid growth in homes and stores along provincial highways, and as an example department officials point to the section of the TCH built to expedite the flow of traffic from Charlottetown to Wood Islands.

For the safety of villagers, who had prior rights in a separate spokesman, said it seemed proper to limit speeds where the new highway passed through existing villages.

Since the highway was put through, groups of buildings have been springing up, in some instances where no road existed before and where the occupants had no prior rights.

"The problem is this: Do we allow these newcomers to gradually throttle the highway by speed reduction areas, or do we use the road as it is intended — as a fast-moving highway?"

"Cases are on record where a such building has been allowed to proceed to the point where the road was no longer able to carry the traffic load and another highway had to be built to carry through traffic. This solution is, of course, very costly and would not be practical in the long run."

The highways spokesman said "a more realistic solution seems to be the construction of buildings on roads existing, or built just off the Trans-Canada, as many are doing in new housing developments. These off-highway streets are safer and quieter and permit full use of our main roads for the purpose for which they were built."

It was pointed out that building along the highway does not give the public "title" to the highway. "When persons ask for a reduced speed zone," the spokesman said, "let them consider that in so doing, they are asking for the right to drive rapidly over a road built with public funds, as a fast-moving highway. In other words, they take their own options to further the interests of the public."

The department of highways is anxious to resist all attempts at speed reductions for the benefit of those who have built along the road was built "if you want to live on a quiet road," the spokesman said, "and we think we should for the sake of the children, by all means build on the quiet road."

"This department, in co-operation with the director of town planning, will be glad to assist in the development of off-highway residential roads."
