PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND HOSPITAL

Annual Meeting Last Night--The Business Transacted.

The Annual Meeting of the P. E. Island Hospital was held last evening in the parlour of the Y. M. C. A.

Quite a number of prominent citizens including several of the leading physicians of the city and a number of ladies were present.

The report of the Trustees, the report of the Treasurer, and the report of the Ladies' Hospital Aid Society, were read and adopted.

The total amount collected up to date for the new hospital fund is \$10,443.57. The expenditure is \$3,537.37. The balance on hand is therefore \$6,806.20.

The expenditure on account of the hospital last year was \$2,818.90 and the receipts, including a balance of \$616.63, \$3,546.31. This leaves a balance on hand of \$727.41.

The two retiring Trustees, Messrs Charles Palmer and L. L. Beer were re-elected, and at a subsequent meeting of the Trustees, Mr. Palmer was unanimously re-elected President.

An animated discussion took place respecting the method to secure sufficient funds to pay for the heating and ventilating apparatus, plumbing, etc., in order to complete the equipment of the Hospital.

The following resolution was moved by Dr. Taylor, seconded by C. C. Gardiner, Esq., and carried unanimously:

"Resolved--That a circular be sent to the friends of the P. E. Island Hospital, asking them to meet at a given place to discuss ways and means for defraying the cost in full of completing the Hospital, including the heating and ventilating of the building."

Dr. Taylor, Dr. McLeod and C. C. Gardiner, Esq., were appointed to be a committee with the Trustees to carry out the above resolution.

It was moved by H. Haszard, Esq., seconded by H. J. Cundall, Esq., and carried unanimously, that a cordial vote of thanks be given to the Ladies' Aid Society, the lady collectors and all others who assisted in raising funds for the institution. Judge Fitzgerald moved that the thanks of the meeting be given to Chas. Palmer, Esq., for the unremitting labors, care, and attention he had given to the Hospital. The motion was seconded by L. L. Beer, Esq., and enthusiastically carried.

Mr. Palmer replied very feelingly and said it was a labor of love.

Dr. Taylor moved that a vote of thanks be given to Dr. Johnson, who he said might be called one of the fathers of the Hospital. Dr. McLeod seconded the motion and said he hoped to see the walls of the New Hospital adorned by an oil portrait of Dr. Johnson.

This motion was also very enthusiastically received.

Dr. Johnson in reply to the vote of thanks said he worked in the interests of the citizens and of christianity, and it would be one of the gratifications of his life when closing his career in this world to know that he left behind him such an institution for the benefit of the sick and suffering.
