U.S. Steel Industry Bets On Low-Grade Iron Ore

IRON ORE (By James Klobuchar) BEAVER BAY, Minn., (AP) - The United States steel industry is betting millions of dollars that marble-sized man-made pellets of iron ore will provide a vast, continuing source of raw material when present reserves of high-grade ore are gone.

These pellets are concentrates of the tiny specks of iron found in an extremely hard rock called taconite. The small amount of iron in taconite and the hard rock's tight grip on the iron makes the material unusable in blast furnaces.

With the end of rich ore in the U. S. only 20 or 30 years away, the problem is to find a way to concentrate the iron in taconite at a cost which is commercially practical. The money and energy which various steel companies are pouring into that job show they think it can be done.

Huge Reserves Taconite reserves are huge since they completely surround the relatively little pockets of high grade ore in the Lake Superior area which have kept the steel industry going for 60 years. Some experts estimate taconite reserves at 5,000,000,000 tons. About 2,000,000 tons of rich ore have been consumed since 1884.

Experiments on concentrating taconite began at pilot plants in the late 1940s. Their work shows there's no question that taconite can be converted into an ore with a higher iron content than the natural ores now being shipped.

Expense Is Hitch

The hitch is in the expense. Taconite contains only about 25 per cent iron while the iron-making blast furnaces require ore with 50 per cent content or better. About three tons of taconite must be processed to get one ton of usable ore.

The concentrating process demands a maze of crushers and magnetic separators to pull the iron specks from the rock. It takes at least three times as many workers to produce a ton of concentrated ore as it does to handle a ton of natural ore.

When the U. S. high grade natural ore is gone, taconite will have to compete with natural ore now being tapped in places such as Labrador and Venezuela. That ore, while rich in iron, must undergo a long voyage which adds to its cost.

Three pilot plants, owned by separate interests, are turning out

U.S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND (AP) - Scrap prices took a nose-dive last week heralding an easing in both steel demand and production. Steel the metal working weekly, reporting that, "scrap is historically a bellwether of business conditions in the steel industry."

"What happens to scrap often happens to steel several months later," the magazine stated. A downward break in scrap prices of, as much as \$5 a ton carried the weekly composite price on steel making grades to \$42.17 a ton, a \$1 decline from the preceding week.

The industry's reported output for the week ended Aug. 29 was 94.5 per cent of rated capacity, a 1.5 point drop from the previous week's figure.

This equaled the lowest mark of the year, set during the week ended July 11, when plant vacations were at their height. Steel reported. It added: "Since the week ended June 8, steel output has not been as high (tonnage-wise in any week as it was in each of this year's 23 weeks prior to June 8."

A drop in steel production percentage constitutes a greater actual lack of use in steel making facilities than the percentage figures indicate, Steel stated. Here is the magazine's explanation: Steel making capacity is still rising and should reach 119,000,000 net tons by the year's end. But operating rates are still calculated on the Jan. 1 rated capacity of 117,500,000 tons.

This production must increase if the actual operating rate is to hold steady. When the operating rate declines, there is more idle equipment than percentage figures indicate.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, (AP) - An unrelieved series of daily losses last week sent the stock market down in the second heaviest weekly fall of the year.

The decline never was urgent. The daily average volume of trading built up to the highest level since mid-June, but it still was below average for the year.

Selling pressure, however, was unrelenting, and it sent the average level of prices down within a short step of the lowest point of this year.

Railroads were under the most pressure despite numerous reports of fine earnings. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined \$3 on the week with five straight falls. It closed at \$104.60, only 40 cents above the low of the year reached on June 9.

The weekly decline was second only to that of the first week of April when the market was jolted down by the Communist proposal for an exchange of Korean prisoners of war.

The five most active issues during the week on the New York Stock Exchange were: Benguet Consolidated Mining up 1/8; New York Central off 1 1/4; Avco Mfg. off 1 1/4; U.S. Steel off 1 1/2; and Baltimore and Ohio off 1 3/8.

The five most active issues on the American Stock Exchange were: Webb and Knapp off 1/16; Jerry O'Mahony off 3/4; Pacific Petroleum Ltd. off 1 1/2; Drilling and Exploration up 3/4 and National Phoenix unchanged at 2 5/8.
