THE WISE-M'KAY ELECTION.

MR. JUSTICE HENSLEY gave judgment to-day in the Wise-McKay election case, and decided that Mr. Wise should have the seat. His Lordship struck off the poll books 23 votes polled for McKay which left 929 recorded for him.

Of the special votes polled, one given for McKay was struck off on account of the land on which the voter claimed to vote being situate on Township No. 33, and consequently out of the district.

EGGS—There has been a good demand for Eggs, but with more liberal receipts the market is easier. Sales of Eastern yesterday at 17c and Western at 16 to 16 1/2c per dozen, but at the close it was hard to get over 16c for Western.

POTATOES—With increased receipts and less demand the market is easier. For the best Rose and Hebrons 63c is a full price, and other kinds 2 to 3c per bushel lower than last week.

FISH—There continues to be a slow trade in Fish, and the market is easier on almost all kinds. Holders of Nova Scotia Mackerel have become anxious, and several lots have been forced off at lower prices.
