

Trainer Work Appreciated By Grand Falls' Citizens

Following is a leading editorial of appreciation, which appeared in a recent edition of the Grand Falls Advertiser for Charlotte-town born Weston "Bucko" Trainor, presently holding the position as Athletic Director in that New-foundland center and former coach of the Charlottetown Islanders and member of the New York Rangers.

QUITE A GUY!

That is how we think of Wes Trainor, our local Athletic Director, and while the phrase may not sound very dignified for editorial comment in a reasonably conservative Weekly. The Advertiser feels that it describes Wes most aptly and accurately.

There is no doubt about it at all, but Wes Trainor is "quite a guy." He is not only a top notch hockey coach, but is a most desirable and admirable citizen as well. The men of his hockey and baseball senior squads respect him, his juniors offer him hero worship as well as respect, and his Little Leaguers love him. What more can we say of one humble individual, and what more could one poor human want? And if this were not enough, the people of this area, those who actually know him, and those who know him only by repute, also hold him in the highest esteem.

We write this today, not because Trainor led his Grand Falls All-Stars to victory in their first encounter against the formidable Buchans aggregate, but because we think the time has come to put in print what everyone is thinking and saying about our Athletic Director. He has labored tirelessly since coming here last June, first with summer sports, including baseball for all ages, swimming, basketball, and sports, etc. then with hockey, where he really shines. Our Little Leaguers are doing remarkably well. They are not only learning the elements of playing good hockey, but they are also learning how to "play the game" well.

Contrary to almost all expectations, Mr. Trainor has succeeded in establishing the new type of hockey clubs—inter-town competition as against denominational Associations. Gone are all the old feuds, without which people said it would be impossible to get crowds in the games. This year, with three league teams, Windsor, Bishop's Falls and Grand Falls, over 6,000 more fans paid admission to one less game than those attending last season's local league games, including playoffs. And for a potential in a town of this size, six thousand people is a lot of people. So at last we can say proudly the "old" club system is gone forever, and a newer, brighter, broader era in local sport has dawned.

Western Rinks Still Dominant In Regina Finals Which End Today; PEI Wins Again

REGINA, (CP)—Manitoba and Saskatchewan still were neck and neck for the Canadian curling championship Thursday with eight rounds completed in the 11-round event.

Saskatchewan held the lead with eight straight wins. Manitoba was second with seven successive victories. The two rinks were to meet Thursday night in the ninth round.

Saskatchewan easily defeated Ontario 15-7, counting a five-ender.

BULLETIN

REGINA (CP)—Saskatchewan remained the only unbeaten rink in the Canadian curling championship Thursday night after defeating Manitoba 8-6, Manitoba previously was unbeaten.

a four-ender and a three-ender up to the seventh end and coasting along from then on.

Manitoba had a good deal of trouble with Northern Ontario, pulling away on late ends to win 10-7.

OUNDLY BEATEN

Alberta disposed of Quebec 17-5 in the eighth round. Nova Scotia, behind 4-2 at the fifth end, pulled ahead with a three-ender on the 10th and two on the 12th to defeat Newfoundland 10-7.

British Columbia trailed P. E. I. 7-5 at the ninth end, tying it on the 11th and losing 8-7 by one on the last end. Reg Stone of Trail was lying three and had a guard out in front when skip Wendell Macdonald delivered his last rock. Macdonald curled in to take out short rock and count the winning point.

Rudy Steski's Northern Ontario rink tied Roy Forsyth of Manitoba 4-4 on the seventh end. Forsyth went ahead on the eighth and counted three more singles to Steski's one for the win. The third end in the match was a two scored by Forsyth on the third.

The eighth round found northern Ontario still sitting in third place with five wins and three losses, followed by Ontario which had won four and lost three. British Columbia shared fifth place with Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia. Each had three wins and four losses. Alberta had three wins and five losses. Newfoundland and Quebec trailed with a single win in seven games.

The Saskatchewan rink had a lot of supporters on hand Thursday. Inhabitants of an entire farming village did the chores early, then looked up for the rest of the day to attend the championships.

Next to tilling the soil the village of Avonlea, 60 miles southwest of Regina, is famed for the calibre of its curlers. The Campbell brothers, who learned to play there, were unbeaten going into the eighth round of round-robin play and everyone who could, made the trip from Avonlea to see them.

A CURLING HOLIDAY
An Overseer Bill Armstrong led the group and reckoned there might be 10 or so of the village's 345 population who wouldn't make the trip. A holiday was declared.

Skip Garnet Campbell was ill starting the seventh round but was leading his rink again in the eighth.

MOVED AHEAD
Saskatchewan took over first place in the seventh round, moving ahead of Manitoba which had a bye, with a 19-8 victory over

Nova Scotia. Northern Ontario remained third after a 12-6 loss to Ontario.

In the other seventh round matches, British Columbia counted two with a well-placed last rock to defeat Newfoundland 12-10. Alberta counted a five-ender and a four-ender for a 10-5 victory over Prince Edward Island in a match that had a record five blank ends; New Brunswick came from behind to win 12-7 over Quebec.

Sullivan passed to Harry Watson at centre ice on the deciding goal at 17:36 of the second period. Watson took the puck down the left side, cut in past Bruins defenceman Bob Armstrong and beat goalie Jim Henry with a skimming shot for the far corner.

The line of Sullivan, Nick Mickoski and Ed Litzenger combined to get Chicago's first two tallies with Boston short-handed each time.

Sullivan opened the scoring at 12:02 of the first period but Boston went ahead on goals by Ed Sandford and Real Chevrefils before the period ended. Litzenger jabbed in a Sullivan rebound to tie it up in the second.
