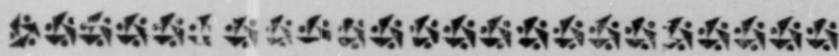

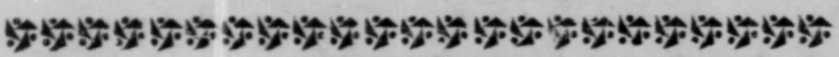

## IN FRANCE, THE DREYFUS DRAMA

### Scenes After the Shooting of Labori

#### RENNES AND PARIS IN HIGH EXCITEMENT

Massacre of the Dreyfusards Projected.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

PARIS, Aug. 15.—The Paris papers condemn the Labori outrage. The Journal Des Debats says: "The revolver shot is bound to be the end and one morning a civil war will rage in Paris."

During the adjournment of the court, yesterday in consequence of the attempt on the life of M. Labori the audience engaged in a violent altercation over the incident Mme Reier, editor of Galois, expressed the opinion that all the newspapers ought to regard themselves as responsible for the outrage whereupon Mme Severine loudly protested, saying, "No 'tis you who ought to be held responsible for what has happened."

The clamor finally became so violent that gardarmes were forced to separate the combatants, and to take away the sticks of all. Peace was finally restored.

Mr. James, the socialist leader, who was in court at the time, remarked that the arrests in Paris had for their sole object to forestall a St. Bartholomew massacre of the Dreyfusards, and that the attempted murder of M. Labori at Rennes was one of the scattered acts of the projected massacre.

#### LABORIS CONDITION

Clemenceau May Take His Place.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.)

LONDON, Aug. 15.—The Times correspondent at Rennes refers to the shooting of M. Labori as "a prodigious drama," and says that it knocks the bottom out of the Dreyfus defence as if the fates had intended to prevent the prisoner's release.

RENNES, Aug. 15.—11.40 p.m. The following bulletin regarding the condition of Labori is issued: "Temperature, 37.05—no fever. Condition stationary."

There is some talk of Albert Clemenceau coming as a substitute for Labori. The question, however, will be definitely decided today. Mr. Clemenceau was one of Zola's counsel at his trial and has followed the Dreyfus case very closely. While he lacks the magnetic influence of Labori in pleading he is extremely skillful in cross examination.

#### REPLY TO MR. BUOTE.

SIR,—In your issue of the 9th inst., I notice a letter signed J. F. Buote, criticizing certain remarks made by "Elector" in your columns a few days ago in connection with the recent bye election here.

Mr. Buote has evidently written his letter with the intention of creating dissatisfaction in the ranks of the Liberal Conservative party in this district. At present we are rejoiced over defeating the Government candidate, and it is surprising that he should attempt to discredit the good work done in the late contest. It may or may not be good policy to have conveners and organizers in the different districts and Mr. Buote may be correct in saying that men like Mr. J. A. Brennan, who do their best in such matters are only injuring the party. At the conference held in Charlottetown last summer Mr. Brennan was appointed convener for the First District of Prince County. In accordance with his instructions he caused meetings to be held in the different polling divisions with the view of strengthening the organization. Meetings were held at Alberton, Kildare, Tignish, Nail Pond, and other places, which were well attended by the electors and arrangements made to have the Conservative vote polled on the day of election.

Those meetings, composed of honest and sincere men who desired by their votes to drive the present Government from power, were appreciated by all and assisted greatly in defeating Mr. Gallant.

It is needless to say that Mr. Buote did not attend any of the meetings, took no part whatever in preparing for the contest but now comes forward to attack the convener, who did the best possible in carrying out the instructions given him by the Secretary of the conference. The district was well organized as admitted by our opponents in the press and otherwise since the election, and it all becomes Mr. Buote to attack the convener at this time. The large vote polled by Mr. Pineau in excess of which Mr. Buote received last year may be a source of irritation to him, but his safest plan is to keep quiet unless he wishes to completely efface himself as a member of the Liberal Conservative party.
