## Sherbrooke Man Elected Junior Farmers President

John Dekker of Sherbrooke was elected president of the East Prince Junior Farmers' Association at its annual meeting and banquet held last evening at the Birch Hill Tourist Lodge with retiring president Glenforde MacLean presiding.

Other officers elected were Darryl Lyle, Lot 16, vice-president; June Hutchinson Lot 16, Secretary; Robert Linkletter, Linkletter Road, treasurer.

Dr. George Fisher, director of veterinary services on P.E.I. was guest speaker and gave a penetrating address on "Prince Edward Island".

Dr. Fisher stated he had watched, with interest, the progress of the East Prince organization over the years and commended them for the excellent work they are doing in their various communities.

**BIG OPPORTUNITIES**

He told his attentive audience of the wonderful opportunities available on P.E.I. insofar as agriculture is concerned adding that agriculturally speaking this province is much better situated than most other parts of Canada.

He said, "We are not feeling the great influx of the central provinces in regards to population and told the junior farmers and their wives that they must prepare to feed the people that are populating these areas.

Regarding markets for agricultural products, Dr. Fisher said "who is in a better position to supply our neighboring provinces who don't produce enough for themselves?"

To support his statements he showed a number of statistics prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics which revealed that P.E.I. is the only province producing more beef and pork in the Atlantic region than she can use.

The figures revealed that the other three provinces are importing tremendous amounts of these two commodities, Dr. Fisher related.

**NEED PLANTS**

The guest speaker stated that this province produces two or three times more horticultural products than it uses and added noted the need for more processing and freezing lockers and to handle this surplus.

Dr. Fisher told how the Yorkshire breed of pigs grown in the province have become famous but found it distressing to see a great number of new breeds being imported.

He said that a good many years of hard work and careful study was necessary to make the Yorkshire famous and said he failed to see why all this should be destroyed through cross breeding that may inevitably result in the disappearance of good Yorkshire breeding stock.

**BUYERS MARKET**

In conclusion Dr. Fisher told the junior farmers, "I feel that agriculture in this province is very bright I think you have one held in Summerside Elementary School, Friday, Nov. 28 at 1:15 p.m.

## Two-Mile Spur Line Slated For S' Side R.C.A.F. Station

MONCTON — Canadian National Railways has announced that a two-mile spur line is to be constructed at Linkletter, P.E.I., for the department of national defence.

D.V. Gonder, vice-president and general manager, Atlantic Region, C.N.R., said the installation is primarily designed to service the R.C.A.F. at the Summerside station. He added, however, that it should be the beginning of considerable development in the area.

The proposed line is to branch off the present R.C.A.F. siding at Linkletter, one mile from St. Eleanor's which is two miles west of Summerside, and will continue to the eastern side of the airport. It will allow for bulk refuelling and further extension of the airport.

Tenders have been called for grading, fencing and ditching. This phase of the project is expected to be completed by March 31st, 1959.

Grading will involve the removal of approximately 40,000 cubic yards of material and the supply of some 8,000 cubic yards of ballast.

Four hundred feet of lineal pipe will be laid for drainage and there will be four miles of fencing.

Target date for completion of the spur line is April 30, 1959.

### Firth D. Bowness Dies At Age 65

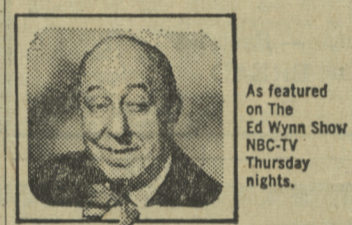
SUMMERSIDE — The death took place suddenly in Summerside Wednesday of Firth Donald Bowness in his 65th year.
