SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

Deep Subjects Discussed by the School

Enrolment of Summer School has reached 196. Every year sees some feature of the school surpassing that of previous years. This year the attendance of members from outside the immediate locality where the school meets is greater than ever. The excellence and variety of the evening lectures surpass that of previous years.

On Thursday evening R. R. McLeod, of Brookfield, Queen's County, N. S., lectured on "Evolution in some of its Aspects." He took advanced ground in favor of evolution, and quoted largely from the writings of leading scientific men from Lucretius to Drummond in favor of the hypothesis.

Dr. Reid, of Middleton, N. S., gave a series of four lectures on health, taking for his subjects: Hygienic buildings, Infectious diseases, Tuberculosis, and Bacteriology. These lectures were replete with information, good practical hints for the preservation of health.

Saturday evening Rev. Mr. Siddell, of Port Medway, N. S., lectured on "Science and the Bible." Commencing with a definition of science and religion, he continued the discussion by saying science and religion began the centuries together; each experienced stress and battle and to each have been given a long roll of martyrs. The estrangement of the past is gone, and today in the march of progress science and religion go hand in hand. Each has its own work to perform in the evolution of man, from the operations of which we have enlargement of life. We owe a great debt to science. Men of science have given us a larger world—broader vision and a clearer insight into things. In our times there are three notable outstanding achievements of science, viz:—reign of law—conservation

of energy—evolution. Evolution is the greatest thought of the century. The lecturer contended that the tendency of science is not towards the omnipotence of matter, but towards the omnipotence of spirit, that the saying of Tyndal, "that in matter is to be discovered the promise and potency of life" is by science of today reversed, and now science teaches that in life is to be found the promise and potency of matter. Mind precedes matter; through mind nature must be read. Men and apes have a different life history. The difference is a chasm not bridged by physical likeness.

Referring to the criticism to which the Bible has been subjected, he claimed that although the critics had dissected the Bible its authority was not one iota impaired. The nerve of Christian theology was not a book but a person, and that person the Christ. The Bible has been enlarged to us by new interpretation and investigation, the result of advancing knowledge and growing light. Miracles were discussed and their reasonableness shown because they belonged to the manifestation of a miraculous Christ. Miracles have had their day and done their work. God has revealed himself to mankind through two books, nature and revelation, which are in thorough accord with each other. The purpose of their united testimony is to show us the Christ who is The Way, the Truth, and the Life.

This thoughtful address commanded the closest attention of the audience, who thoroughly appreciated it.

THE BOAT RACE.

Great interest was taken in the sail boat race today. But the tragedy in connection therewith soon drew attention from the race. A finer field of boats was never before got together in Charlottetown Harbor. The start was made at ten minutes to eleven. The Flint got over the line first, closely followed by the Freda and the Rescue, the Report and the Stranger, with the others close behind. When the boats were off the Driving Park on the first course the Gentlemen capsized. Several of the boats rounded up, but the race went on. In passing Connolly's wharf on the first heat to windward Onward led, Flint second and Freda third. At the end of the first round the Freda was leading, Onward second, Flint third, Rescue fourth. Report fifth.

On the second round the Freda increased her lead and finished at 1.33 making the course in two hours and forty three minutes. Onward finished second, Flint third, Rescue fourth and Report fifth. Most of the other boats dropped out before the finish.

The Freda is a new boat built by Mr. James Griffin. She was sailed by Frank Docherty, James Hughes and Ephraim Gallant.
