

Contract For Summerside Firms At Camp Gagetown

OTTAWA (Special) — Prince Edward Island contracting firms are receiving a share of contracts let for construction of the huge new military camp at Gagetown, N.B., it was learned here Monday. The Summerside firm of M. F. Schurman was awarded a contract for \$462,600 for construction of a sewage treatment plant, and that of Morrison and MacRae, also of Summerside, an award of \$90,885 for grubbing and clearing a section of the campsite. The Morrison and MacRae firm also received a small award of \$860 for construction of a firebreak at the camp.

Retired S'ide Man Celebrates 81st Birthday

He was one of the pioneer employees of the Summerside Light and Power Department when the plant was situated on Fitzroy Street, with Mr. John Taylor, then plant manager. Mr. Sudsby is one of the best living authorities on the early history of the town and can tell many an interesting anecdote about the town and its inhabitants of many years ago.

Rear Admiral Alonzo Sherwood Sabin, in command of amphibious force which has just arrived from the Philippines, declared: "If I am fired upon I will fire back." Two Red mines were swept up as the navy moved into Tachens waters. Frog men under water demolition teams—probed the waters for mines and other obstacles and completed a beach survey. A navy beach master declared the withdrawal will be "painfully slow" because of 150 tons and poor beaches on the Tachens. Under the withdrawal plans, civilians will be taken off first. Most of them are on Lower Tachen, the southern island. The bulk of the garrison is on Upper Tachen and these soldiers will withdraw last.
