A LIBERAL PROTECTIONIST.

(Montreal Gazette)
Mr. Bertram, the Liberal nominee in Centre Toronto, is not in this campaign a free trader. He argues that the present is not a free trade tariff and that it should stand. The policy of the Liberal party, he says, is not free trade, and, so far as Canada is concerned, free trade, he argues, is out of the question. He even goes further and claims that the Liberal party is not a free trade party, and points to the tariff it enacted as proof of the soundness of his position. This marks a very great change in the Liberal attitude within two years. The platform on which the last general election was won, adopted by the Liberal conference at Ottawa, over which Sir Oliver Mowat presided, and at which Sir Wilfrid Laurier declared that protection was vicious in principle, and Sir Richard Cartwright called it not only a crime but a blunder, contained this plank:
We denounce the principle of protection as radically unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fail to afford any substantial relief from the burdens under which the country labors."

The above, of course, represented the theory of the Liberal party before the responsibilities of office were placed upon its leaders' shoulders. The first tariff draft submitted by Mr. Fielding, showed that it had been modified largely in the course of the enquiries he made during his visits to the industrial centres of the country. The revised draft, submitted to Parliament after a month's consideration of the original resolutions, still more strongly emphasized the fact that ministers had been compelled by a business consideration of the industrial situation to adhere to protection.
