

Cabinet Ministers Scarce At Ottawa Next Weeks

OTTAWA (CP) — Cabinet ministers will be a rarity in the capital for the next two or three weeks.

All but two of the 19 members of the cabinet, including Prime Minister St. Laurent, have left or are making plans for vacations. Most of them will be away until after Labor Day, Sept. 3, resting up after one of the most hectic Parliamentary sessions in years.

The two who do not plan to leave are Revenue Minister McCann and Mines Minister Prud-

ham. Dr. McCann will be at his home in nearby Renfrew, Ont., and plans to be at his office in Ottawa several times a week.

Mr. Prudham says he has enough work to keep him busy at his desk for the rest of the month.

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750-Acre Lake Will Beautify Niagara And Add To Power

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP)—Another project to turn the tremendous potential of Niagara Falls into electrical power—without interfering with its natural beauty—will be completed within about seven months.

The project is a huge man-made lake, being built by the Ontario Hydro - Electric Power Commission, which will store excess water from the plunging torrents to be turned when needed into electricity.

The 750-acre lake, of 4,000,000 gallons capacity, will feed one of the largest power stations of its type in the world.

Here is how the project developed. Canadian-American agreement on preserving the beauty of the falls states that at least 100,000 cubic feet of water must flow over the lip of the falls every second during the day.

Canadian and American power stations already operating at the falls draw on water over this figure to turn their turbine-operated generators. But at certain seasons and times, there are hundreds of thousands of cubic feet of water pouring over the falls and being lost—along with the power potential it represents.

Since generated power cannot be stored, the only solution was to draw off this water, store it, and when the flow of water becomes low release it.

That is what Ontario Hydro will be doing. The lake, 60 feet deep at one end and 30 feet deep at the other, is a concrete-lined basin lying between the two large tunnels which feed water into the gigantic Sir Adam Beck No. 2 generating station.

Water is pumped into the reservoir by a unique plan. The "pumps" are circular devices, something like a windmill fan. But the blades have a variable pitch-set one way, they can be operated to force water into the lake.

The "pumps"-turned - turbines drive the generators, which when operating at peak can produce 225,000 horsepower. Six generating units, the largest in Hydro's system, are being installed.

USED TWICE

The storage lake is doubly valuable because, after turning the generators at the upper level power station, the water can be directed through generating pens in the Sir Adam Beck station.

The project was started in 1954.

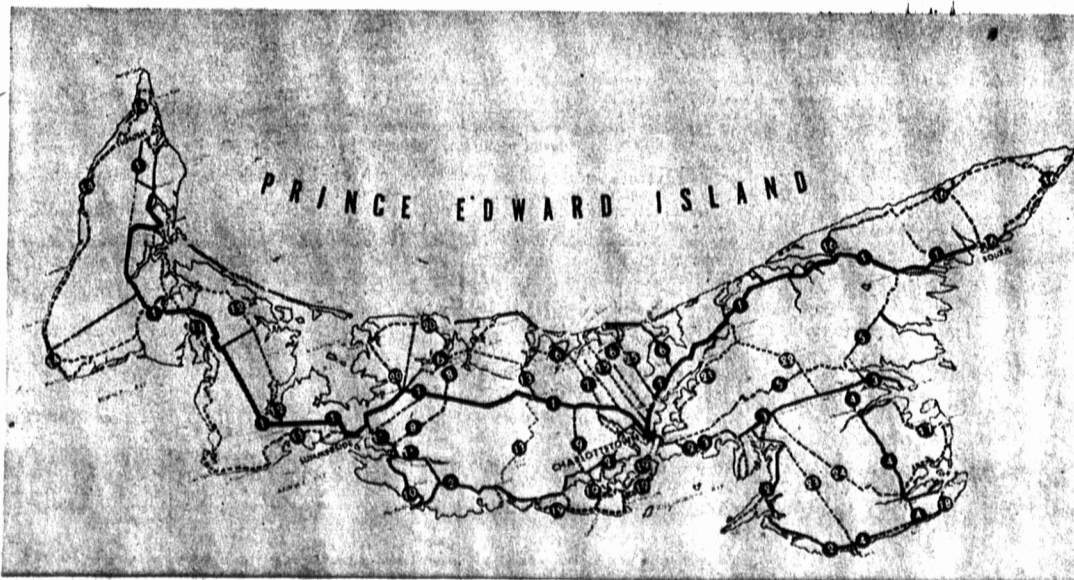
