Legislative Council Elections.

Just a week from to-day, the Legislative Council Electors will have a chance to say:

Whether or not they enjoy an interminable succession of elections?

Whether or not sixty three men (including officials) are required to take part in the legislation of this Province?

Whether or not, with a jealous public opinion having the right to petition and agitate, alive Press, and representatives at Ottawa, the Minister of Justice, the Dominion Cabinet and the Governor-General to watch the Bills which pass through our Legislature, a Second Chamber is necessary?

Whether or not it is expedient to throw away thousands of dollars every year upon a useless Second Chamber, while we so much want money for the improvement of improved stock and for the maintenance of our roads, bridges, and schools?

Whether or not the interests of property are likely to be attacked while the great bulk of the electors and all the members of the Legislature are—and always will be—property-holders?

These are important questions. Let no side issue divert the attention of electors from them. Let them be answered on their merits.

We appeal with confidence to the good sense of an intelligent electorate.

Editorial Notes.

To-morrow is Thanksgiving Day; and the people of this Island have much to be thankful for. We have had a fine season—a good harvest—take all round; and complete immunity from war and pestilence, individually many of us have had losses and reverses; but who knows that these were not sent for our good. At any rate, let us thank God and take courage.

"The Cloture" has been carried in the British House of Commons; and, as it affects the House of Commons only, it will probably pass in the House of Lords. Speech in the greatest of deliberative assemblies will then be free only so long as "The Majority" desire it to be free. There are two singular facts in connection with the application of this "cloture": (1) It was brought in by a Liberal Minister, and (2) It was supported and voted for by the very obstructionists whose conduct rendered it necessary.

In King's County, N.B., yesterday, Mr. Foster was re-elected by a majority of nearly three hundred. There can be no doubt that Mr. Domville could have stood in a better position with reference to his Party, and the Country at large, had he resigned in the result obtained at the General Election. The man who knows when to bow judiciously to the will of the people, is the strong man, and the man whose popularity will last. Squabbling and taking advantage of little law points to oust a partisan and quondam friend from a coveted office or a "seat," is an offence so mean and contemptible, that it sinks in the nostrils of the people. The man once guilty of it can never again rise high in public estimation.

Arabi then went to the magistrates, took out papers and had the constable arrested for assault. Two magistrates not on the case, so rumour says, one of whom is a descendant of Noah's, and would have filled his office well in these times, as the result will show. The constable was tried in the absence of the plaintiff and acquitted.

We are indebted to Mr. H. Edmund Swaley for California papers. From the Red Bluff People's Cause we clip the following extraordinary item:—One of the most novel sights, seldom if ever witnessed in any other country except California, can now be seen on Dr. Glenn's Colusa county ranch. It is said that men are engaged thrashing and sowing grain in the same field, while a large volunteer crop is already up two or three inches high and growing nicely. Here is this year's crop of wheat being put into sacks ready for shipment to the European markets; next year's crop being cultivated in summer following the second year's crop and a growing crop well advanced for this season of the year.

The reports from all the mines of Nova Scotia and Cape Breton show a large increase in the output and sales. 6,238 tons were shipped from Pictou during the week and 40,000 tons, making the total shipments to date this season, \$2,514,000. The shipments from Cape Breton during the quarter ending October, 30th, amounted to 200,000 tons, an increase of 30,000 tons over the corresponding period last year.

Grit Meeting at Lot 11.

THE PARTY COMPLETELY SHATTERED—CASTING UP EACH OTHERS CHARACTERS.

ACCORDING to notice a meeting was held in the Freehold Lot 11 School-house, on Friday evening, Nov. 3.

Thomas H. Pope, Esq., of Bidford, in the Chair. No Secretary could at first be found, until Donald McDougall, of Grand River, after a great deal of coaxing, consented to act.

The Grit lights present were James Yeo, M.P., Hon. John Yeo, Benjamin Rogers, Alberton; Mr. Martin, Tignish; William Callaghan, Miminogash; and the candidates of the Grit Convention at Alberton, viz., J. F. White, Alberton; Augustus Callaghan and Joseph Murphy, of Lot 11; and John O'Connor, of Lot 14.

BENJAMIN ROGERS was the first speaker. He said that he and Perry, and Matheson, called the Convention. It consisted of forty-one delegates—White having 21 votes, Callaghan, 13. The Convention bound itself before voting, to support the candidates having the most votes, but it was found that corruption was used, and that they did not feel themselves bound by the vote, and as White, Murphy and Callaghan were in the field, it was now for them to try to choose one of the three.

J. F. WHITE said he was the nominee of that Convention and would not give way.

JOSEPH MURPHY said he was fifty-five years old, and he was the representative of the farming class, would not resign, was sure of his election.

AUGUSTUS CALLAGHAN was willing, on any grounds, to arrange between the parties, and should support the one chosen.

The Messrs. Yeo, Wm. Callaghan and Martin followed, all appealing for the three to give way, as the Grit cause was hopeless. But all in vain.

The meeting was then thrown into disorder. Resolution after resolution was moved, but could not be put to the meeting owing to the noise.

Each Candidate felt sure of his election; but the other Grit luminaries thought that owing to the split Mr. Reid would retain his seat.

The brilliant orations of the Grits proved useless; and the meeting broke up without coming to any decision, so that there are now three Grits in the field.

There are some in favor of creating bigoted feeling by taking out a Protestant and running him on that principle, but the intelligence of this District no doubt resent this.

The Lot 11 Grits are terribly excited; and Captains Ramsay, Smith and Luk's travelling to Port Hill for the gentlemen there to support their candidate, was met by refusal.

The prospect for Mr. Reid's return is growing brighter every day. It was very amusing to see the Grits casting up to each other, at the meeting, their characters.

Yours, ONE WHO WAS PRESENT.

The body of a whale over seventy-five feet in length was picked up recently by a fishing boat belonging to Cape North, and towed into Money Point, Aspy Bay, where it has since been converted into oil and sold on Monday to merchants here. The whale was killed by a large harpoon, which entered under one of its fins, and went within a foot of the opposite side. The harpoon is a peculiarly constructed weapon, and must have been fired by a cannon. It is now in possession of parties at North Cape. Can the wonderful weapon be Bannan's harpoon, which was used with such fatal effect at Donner's Head last spring?—N. Sydney Herald.

Four forty pounder rifle guns have recently arrived in Canada from England. They will be placed one each at Quebec, Montreal, Kingston and Toronto. They cost the Government \$400 sterling, or only a small portion of what the cost would have been had the guns been purchased in the ordinary way.

The North American Squadron will leave Halifax for winter quarters this month. The "Atherton" and "Lancelot" are going to St. John's, where they will meet the transport "Newby," which is to bring out Sir Edward Campbell, the new Admiral.
