SUDDEN DEATH.—The Summerside Agriculturist says:—On Wednesday last, Mrs. Peter Gallant, while working in the Hotel Russ, was stricken by a fit of apoplexy, caused by the bursting of a blood vessel in the head. Mr. Russ immediately summoned Dr. McKay, on arrival, saw that the unfortunate woman had but a few hours to live. He called to Dr. Gillis, and she was then conveyed to her home a few yards distant, where, despite medical skill, she died about eleven o'clock the same evening. The deceased was an elderly woman, and leaves several children.

A PECULIAR CASE.—An English paper records the following peculiar case: A woman recently made a very singular application to a Greenwick magistrate. She stated that she had two husbands, both of whom were the sons of one mother, but not of the same father. The first husband died four years ago, and she married the second one eighteen months since. He would not now support her, and she asked advice as to the legality of her marriage, and wished to know what to do. The magistrate said that the question was a conundrum which he could not answer. The law did not allow her to marry two brothers. The applicant, he said, had better throw herself on the parish, and they would see the case settled for her.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Interview with Parnell.

LONDON, Jan. 16. A reporter of the Freeman's Journal has had an interview with Parnell. Parnell believes there is no doubt that grave dissensions exist among the members of the cabinet, and the Government party, and that a crisis may occur at any time next session, over some English question. He urges the Parnellites and Radicals to facilitate the Government business, and thus avoid a charge of obstruction. He separates the Liberal-Unionists are certain to the recent reductions of rent made by the land commissioners are not half what the tenants of Ireland are entitled to, and urges the party to take such action as will oblige the sub-commissioners to re-examine the whole question.

Blizzard Fatalities.

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 16. The Journal's revised list of blizzard fatalities shows 97 dead in Dakota, 12 in Minnesota, 6 in Iowa, 17 in Nebraska and 2 in Montana; total 135, besides 55 reported missing. St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 16. Scattering reports of the loss of limb in the great storm of last week continue arriving. In addition to the list of 140 dead published this evening reports have been received to-night swelling the numbers to 152.

The Pope's Mediation.

PARIS, Jan. 16. The Universe has a despatch from Rome saying that the English cabinet accepts in principle the Pope's mediation between England and Ireland, based upon Mgr. Persico's report. The Pope demands moderate Home Rule and advises the Conservatives to take the wind out of Gladstone's sails by adopting the leading points of his programme with the support of the Irish clergy.

Another Railway Accident.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 16. This afternoon a freight train on the Pittsburg & St. Louis Railway, while crossing a high bridge at Temperanceville Station, inside the city limits, eight freight cars left the track from a supposed opening rail. Two cars fell to the street, ninety feet, and were smashed to splinters. One employe was instantly killed and another seriously injured.

The Colliery Disaster.

PICTOU, Jan. 16. Thousands of people yesterday visited the scene of the mining explosion at Stelarton. The explosion occurred in the Douglas Slope of the Albion Mine, and not in the cage pit as reported yesterday. Agent Poole says the mine is not irretrievably ruined, but the damage done is enormous, besides throwing 300 miners out of work.

His Followers Dissatisfied.

DUBLIN, Jan. 16. The followers of Parnell in Parliament are greatly dissatisfied with his advice given in the interview with the Freeman's Journal reporter, to abandon the obstruction methods in the House of Commons.

Supreme Court.

SATURDAY, JAN. 14. Queen vs. Madden and Dogherthy—Indictment for burglary. The trial lasted all day. The prisoners were acquitted, the evidence being purely circumstantial. Mr. Justice Peters, who tried the case, directed the jury that before they could convict they must be satisfied beyond all reasonable doubt that the prisoners were guilty, and they must be satisfied of this by evidence, not mere suspicion or probabilities. The jury after a few minutes absence found a verdict of "Not Guilty." Attorney-General for the Crown; F. Peters for prisoners.

TUESDAY, JAN. 17.

The Queen vs. Owen Smith and Joseph H. Dunne—Indictment for housebreaking and larceny. This case occupied the attention of the Court all day yesterday. There being no evidence against Dunne, he was, on motion of his counsel, discharged. The case against Smith went to the jury, who remained out all night, and this morning reported that they could not agree upon a verdict, and were accordingly discharged. Smith will probably be tried again this evening. Attorney-General for Crown; James H. Reddin for defendant.

McBride vs. Webster—Action for trespass. This case began yesterday, and is still before the Court. C. B. Macneill and F. Peters for plaintiff; E. J. Hodgson for defence.

In the case of R. R. Fitzgerald, S. M., vs. William R. Frame, editor of the Island Guardian, application was to-day made by Mr. Macleod, the defendant's counsel, to have the case postponed on account of the illness of his client. Mr. Macleod produced several affidavits, showing the pre-arranged condition of the defendant to be examined as a witness. The Court granted a rule nisi returnable to-morrow morning.
