T. Stetson, although a complete stranger, seems to have caught the public to a nicety. He is undoubtedly an actor of culture, refinement and strong physique, and in the portrayal of the Kentucky hero displays a combination of rugged pathos, strong elocution, and quiet humor. That his drama was a success the more than lavish applause testified, whilst the curtain was drawn up repeatedly at the close of the tableaux." Mr. Stetson is highly spoken of as a legitimate Shakespearean actor, and we hope the management will, during their stay, give us Hamlet, Macbeth, or some one of the Divine Bard's productions.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

New York, July 10.

It is stated that Dr. Tanner is suffering intensely from the unnatural strain on his system from his lengthened fasting, but his great will power enables him to endure it without flinching.

The "World" says there is no truth in the reported resignation of Hancock from the army.

Several factories in New Jersey closed yesterday owing to the excessive heat.

St. Louis, July 11.

Advices from Western Kansas state that hundreds of families suffering from drought are on their way to Oklahoma.

H. L. Hillan, an old Scout with Capt. Payne last spring, says that the party which left Wichita, Kansas, last Sunday, arrived safely and found corn and vegetables planted by them doing finely. Jack Bettle, a scout from Texas, was found there, and stated that a thousand men from Texas could be on the territory in ten days. Hillan wrote from Arkansas City, at which point he telegraphed to numerous parties along the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fee, Kansas and Pacific Railroad, to push on at once. It looks as though the invasion of the territory would be formidable, and that if the military are instructed to eject intruders there will be a conflict.

London, July 10.

The Standard says: "We understand that the Earl of Kenmore, Lord Chamberlain, has intimated his wish to resign in consequence of his opposition to the compensation bill."

It is said to be the intention of Parnell and his followers to oppose the third reading of the compensation bill, if the amendment of the Attorney General is carried.

The colliers strike in Leicestershire has ended. Three thousand strikers have returned to work, having accepted 5 per cent reduction of wages.

The Dublin correspondent of the News telegraphs that a large case of rifles has been seized at Wexford, near Loughrea. The rifles were the property of peasants but were addressed to local landlords who knew nothing of them.

A movement has been organized, over which O'Connor Power has been invited to preside, and of which Biggar, Finnegan and Barry to obtain a full unconditional amnesty, and to extend the movement through Great Britain, Ireland, the United States and Colonies until its object is attained.

Dublin July 10.

Reports to the trustees of the Marlborough Relief Fund show there is nothing remarkable in the prevalence of the fever in Levensford District.

St. Petersburg, July 10.

The official reports state that in upwards of forty districts in Russia the crop is below the average. In many provinces the prospects are very serious. In some districts in the South the crops have failed owing to the ravages of insects.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 11.

Miss Biddie McRae, of Chatham, Ont., died here June 26, after premature birth of a child. Dr. Elychon, of Buffalo, has been arrested on a charge of having attended her professionally. She refused to divulge the name of her betrayer, claiming ignorance.

Athens, July 11.

England and France have advised Greece to postpone calling out the reserves until the collective note is received and replied to by Turkey and Greece, to avoid offering the Porte any pretext for resistance.

Vienna, July 10.

It is stated that there is no truth in the report of Hassan Pasha's death.
