

City Rifle Club To Hold First Prov. Indoor Meet

At Tuesday night's competition conducted at the RCMP ranges by the Charlottetown Civilian Rifle Club, it was announced that the Provincial Indoor Rifle Meet, which will take place at the local ranges on Saturday, April 27, with the first event getting underway at 10 a.m.

The secretary Dave Johnson reveals that for these competitions there will be a classification of all shooters, based on scores obtained in matches fired so far this season.

The classes will be: Master, which are those who have averaged 96 or better. Expert, 92 to 95.99, Sharpshooter, 88 to 91.99, and marksman, all those below 85.

All matches will be conducted under the same regulations that govern the Canadian Civilian Rifle Club, and the Maritime Association of Marksmen and the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association. In regard to weapons any approved .22 calibre rifle may be used. Two rifles are available on loan at the ranges.

The program will consist of four individual events and an aggregate, plus one team event. The four individual matches are, the MacLean and Son Ltd., RCMP Station Summerside, York Rifle Club, and the Murray Harbor Rifle Club.

The aggregate for these events will be known as the R. C. Rawise Championship Aggregate. The single team competition, the Charlottetown Rifle Club team match, will be between teams of any four shooters, with no limit to the number of entries.

At this week's shoot, Al Mutch and Eldon MacLean, both of Charlottetown, each came up

with scores of 99 out of a possible 100. Top place was awarded by the judges to Mutch, who had seven of his ten shots in the "X" ring as compared to five for MacLean.

Maroons Stay Alive; Down Bulldogs 3-1

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP)—Windsor Maroons Wednesday night extended the Allan Cup final to at least a fifth game by handing Windsor Bulldogs a 3-1 defeat in a sell-out Windsor Arena crowd of 5,110.

Spurred by the clutch goal-tending of Don Collins, Maroons scored once in each period to hand the Bulldogs their first defeat in the series. Windsor holds a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven set. The fifth game is here Friday night.

The Winnipeggers, out-lucked 8-0 in the first three games in

many instances, gave it a great effort and were full value for their victory.

Chuck Lumsden, Shorty Melnychuk and Lloyd Orris were the goalgetters with Real Chevrette clicking for Windsor.

Collins, who sat out the first two games, turned in a sparkling chore in the nets. Time and again, the 31-year-old picked off Windsor drives.

Wayne Rutledge at the other end kept his mates in the game through the first period.

HELD EDGE

As in the second game of the

series for the Canadian senior championship, Maroons had an overwhelming edge in the opening period but could only beat Rutledge once. The big youngster made 12 saves, at least six of them labelled.

Lumsden found a hole in his armor at 4:29, moving out from the back fence to lift home a high, 16-foot backhand. Bulldogs, although out-played, managed 1:1 deadlock with a power-play goal at 16:08. Chevrette tipped Jack Costello's long shot. Collins stopped it neatly but in trying to grab the bounding disc, inadvertently flipped it over the goal line.

The second period belonged to the goaltenders with Collins, but the Maroons finally scored in the final minute. A wild scramble ensued around the Windsor crease and both Real Rutledge and Bud Hillman thought they had the puck covered, but Melnychuk moved in quickly

from the point when he saw it loose and scored.

Orris, an outstanding performer throughout the series, clinched it at 8:37 of the third period. He found himself with a loose puck and a clear path and moved to the crease to deke Rutledge expertly.

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Two-Strike Hits Dave Demeter Bating Lead

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Don Demeter attributes his National League batting leadership to his becoming a two-strike hitter.

Demeter is leading the league with a .440 average, has the most hits by any player in the majors, 22, and is second in runs batted in with 13 and in home runs with four.

The Jack-of-all-trades of Philadelphia Phillies—plays outfield, third, first—also credits his early season success to steady work, a shorter swing and a wider stance.

Manager Gene Mauch, how ever, says Demeter's sudden emergence as a two-strike-hitter is the big item in his improved hitting.
