NATIONAL PRESIDENT ADDRESSES LOCAL CONSERVATIVES LAST NIGHT

The reallocation of taxation fields to provide the Provinces and municipalities with more adequate revenue was emphasized last night by Mr. George Hees, M.P., Toronto-Broadview, national president of the Progressive Conservative Association, following his arrival in Charlottetown by air from Newfoundland. Mr. Hees, who is accompanied by Mrs. Hees, is on a Maritime tour and will leave for Nova Scotia on Monday.

Mr. Hees has visited the Province on several occasions before and Mrs. Hees as a young girl spent at least three summers at a Brackley Beach Hotel. Both of them were greatly impressed with the beauty of the Island from the air.

At a meeting of the Queens County Progressive Conservative Association held in Charlottetown last night, Mr. Hees said in part: "Since my arrival in the Maritime Provinces, I have found that there is some uncertainty existing as to the procedure with regard to the Dominion-Provincial Taxation Agreement which would be followed by the Conservative Party when we form a Government. So that there may be no further misunderstanding on this point, I would like now to outline our policy in this matter."

"When we form a Government, the Dominion Provincial tax agreements which are in force at that time will be continued with all the provinces which wish to have them continued. They are legal contracts and will be respected in letter and spirit."

Conservative Position Mr. Hees went on to explain, that the position of the Conservative Party has always been that any Province wishing to make an agreement of this kind is entitled to do so. "We believe that the annual

tax rentals paid to the Provinces are not adequate to meet the needs of the provinces and also the municipalities which gave up taxing powers at that time."

Mr. Hees further asserted that it was the belief of his Party that the present tax agreements do not leave the municipalities with adequate tax fields from which to draw the revenues needed to meet their rapidly increasing obligations to the people they serve.

The National President outlined briefly the policy of Mr. George Hees when he was Premier of Ontario, in which he pointed out that Mr. Drew proposed that all corporation income taxes collected by the Dominion Government from large corporations with head offices in Ontario be distributed on the basis of the business done in each province and paid to the provincial governments.

The meeting was attended by the Provincial executive of the Conservative party, provincial members, nominated candidates, District presidents and county presidents.

After a most successful Party meeting held last night in the City, Mr. George Hees, National President of the Progressive Conservative Party with Mrs. Hees will today visit various points of interest in the Province, at which time they hope to meet some of the key workers of the Party. Mr. Hees expects to get in a round of golf on Sunday, July 25, where Mr. Hees will address a meeting on the same night.

MELBOURNE (Reuters) — Fifty pounds of beef steak is to be flown to the Australian team at Vancouver for the British Empire and Commonwealth Games.

Reports published were that the Australians are complaining about not getting enough steak in their training diet has prompted the move.

The steak has been given by a Sydney meat firm, and a brewery has paid for it to be flown to Canada today.

People Minus Tonsils More Susceptible To Bulbar Type Polio

CHICAGO (AP)—Polio victims who have had their tonsils removed are four times as likely as other polio patients to develop the serious bulbar type that often requires long lung treatment, two Minnesota doctors report.

They say this is probably the reason why a higher percentage of adult victims than child victims develop the more serious bulbar type.

Writing in the Journal of the American Medical Association they say: "This tendency for older persons to have a bulbar type of disease is due to the fact that they are more likely to have had their tonsils removed than are children and it is the absence of tonsils rather than the age that conditions the bulbar type of response to infection."

The finding, by Dr. Gaylord W. Anderson and Jeanne Roudreau of the University of Minnesota school of public health was based on a study of more than 3,000 victims of a 1945 polio outbreak in Minnesota.

They say it is probable that tonsillectomy removes some "natural barrier" which prevents the spread of polio virus from the throat to the nerve centres in the brain. They say almost everyone gets polio but the infection is too light to be diagnosed in the vast majority of cases. However, there was evidence that recent tonsillectomy, on a study of more than 3,000 victims of a 1945 polio outbreak in Minnesota.
