Eight miles of light paving on the Commercial Road, between Montague and Murray River, have been completed this week, a task which delayed by inclement weather has taken about three weeks. The newly paved portion extends from Whim Road to Murray River. The Montague end had been paved several years ago.

With the completion of this road there is now a paved link between Charlottetown and Murray River, and also with Georgetown and Cardigan, the new highway having been completed in that area this year.

It is not known whether the Murray River road will be completed to Murray Harbour, but it is noticed that sub-grading is proceeding well towards the Harbour, which may indicate that this road will be completed at some future date.
