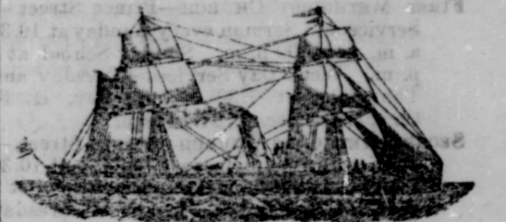

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

MONTREAL, July 7. The strikers on the wharves opened hostilities here, to-night, by firing on the police, who were protecting a gang of men at work on the Dominion Line of steamers.

In the evening the longshoremen held a mass meeting in the east end when some exciting language was used. They subsequently formed a procession and marched up to the city along the wharves. On arriving at Donnelly's wharf, where a number of men were engaged in unloading one of the steamships, the strikers called upon them to stop and followed up with threats of violence if they did not by firing revolvers. The men quietly desisted and then left the grounds. The procession then reformed and proceeded to the Dominion Line, where they attempted to drive off the gang of men engaged on the vessels, but were met by a force of police and the captain, who directed the mob to disperse. The answer he got was a volley of shots from revolvers, which, however, had no injurious effect upon the policemen. A magistrate who was present read the Riot Act, after which the police fired upon the rioters, wounding three or four, but not dangerously, so far as can be ascertained. The police next made a charge on the disturbers of the peace and drove them off, some shots being fired by the retreating strikers. The officers afterwards arrested some of the party and locked them up. Sgt. Reeves was with his men when the city police made the charge up the hill, and noticing one man in the act of firing a stone, he rushed into the crowd of strikers and seized him. The sergeant was followed by Morrison and Gravel, two policemen, and upon these the strikers turned, attacking them to rescue their prisoners. Just then there was a rush up the hill by the police, armed with their rifles, and the strikers gave away before the determined crowd, the butt ends of their rifles being laid about their shoulders and ribs as they ran across Jacques Cartier Square. The names of the men arrested are Oliver Taylor and Wm. Power. A large force of police is engaged in patrolling the wharves at midnight, and all is quiet at 1 a. m.

EUROPEAN. LONDON, July 7. The Pall Mall Gazette says the situation in Northern Africa is very serious. There are points in the Sultan's African dominions to threaten which would compel England to enter the field. The interests of France and England would be best served by making that fact clearly understood on both sides of the channel.

TUNIS, July 7. Private telegrams say that the French commenced shelling Spax on the 5th inst. Fire was returned from that town. No details of fighting. The telegraph is working badly.

BERLIN, July 7. Count Katsfelk has been appointed Secretary of Foreign Affairs, and will present Bismarck during the latter's absence.

LONDON, July 7. The Times says satisfaction will be felt at the authoritative statement that the Anglo-French commercial treaty negotiations are to be resumed at the end of July.

At Newmarket the race for the Horse Heath stakes, six furlongs, was won by Lefevre's Tristan; Lorillard's Barret second; Keene's Marshal Macdonald third. Four ran.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, July 7. The President passed a most comfortable night, and continues steadily to improve. He is cheerful and asks for additional food. Attorney General McVeagh says the President's condition is very favorable indeed. He says he does not consider that the President is out of danger yet, but says he appears to be passing out of it as steadily and rapidly as can be expected.

Railroad men say it was almost a miracle that the train which brought Mrs. Garfield to Washington was not wrecked, and all on board killed. A parallel rod on the side of the engine broke while the wheels were making 250 revolutions a minute. The rod is twelve feet long, six inches wide, and four thick. The broken rod bounced with each revolution of the wheels, tore up the ties, and considerably damaged the engine. The train ran two miles before a stop could be effected, so great was the momentum attained. As the train flew by Bowie station the splinters of the shattered ties filled the air.

The members of the New York Chamber of Commerce have presented Mrs. Garfield with \$250,000 as a mark of their esteem and sympathy, and as a means of relieving the mind of the President from anxiety with regard to the future of his family.

CINCINNATI, July 7. A disastrous fire occurred here to-day. The latest estimates place the cost at \$684,000. Twenty-four workmen are unaccounted for, and it is fair to assume that some were lost by being overcome by the heat in the building, though only one life is positively known to be lost.

PHILLIPS, ME., July 7. A frightful accident occurred at Rungly on Wednesday, in raising a meeting house frame. The roof was being put on when the big timber rafters and fifteen men fell through to the ground floor, and one man through that to the cellar. Ten men were more or less injured, though it is hoped none fatally.

REV. WM. HOOPER, of Exeter, Ontario, will preach in the Bible Christian Church, to-morrow evening.

The brig, Paces, Fairlyson, owned by M. Foley, arrived at Halifax yesterday from Barbadoes with a cargo of sugar.

The Rev. W. B. Binson will preach morning and evening at the first Baptist Church, Sunday July 10th, in the absence of its Pastor.

We are again indebted to Dr. Strickland for late New York papers—containing the fullest particulars about the attempted assassination of the President.

In company with Hon. D. Ferguson and C. C. Gardiner, Esq., Hon. Neil Dow and A. M. Powell, Esq., are this afternoon visiting the Stock Farm and the Hospital for the Insane.

The friends of Temperance will be glad to hear that a branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance will be formed in this city on the 19th inst. The Rev. Thomas Gales of Montreal is expected to be present.

Whose duty is it to remove dead animals which are rotting on the public streets? For days the south end of Hillsborough street has been almost impassable. What are we paying heavy taxes for? Is it only to keep up a Corporation?

The progress of Montreal last year is shown very conclusively by the following Customs returns—The duties received for the fiscal year ending 30th ult. were \$7,077,793, an increase of \$1,844,991 over 1880, \$3,000,000 over 1879, and exceeding the most prosperous year Canada had ever previously known, that of 1874-5, by \$1,200,000. The receipts for last June were \$710,928, an increase of 25 per cent. over the corresponding month of 1880.

ON Grafton street opposite Peales' corner, grows a beet which we suggest shall be pulled and exhibited at the Halifax Exhibition, as a sample of best grown on the streets of Charlottetown. Were it to be shown at present and were the fact brought to his notice, he would doubtless write a fable showing there is a great deal of irony in the action of this beet. In this fable we would not be surprised to hear a stranger ask, "Mr. Beet, why growest thou upon the street?" Mr. Beet, of course, would make the following answer, "Why, you see sir the P. E. Island farmer declines to experiment with me upon his farm. I therefore, to prove I am a profitable and easily grown plant, have to experiment upon the street."

THE REV. DR. MCKAY, of the Formosa Mission, will address a public meeting, on Sabbath next, at 6 o'clock, in St. James' Church; subject: "His life and work in Formosa." As Dr. McKay will leave the city on Monday morning, the meeting now announced will be the only opportunity for people here to hear this remarkable Missionary relate his experience. The trustees of the church will endeavor to accommodate the largest number possible, with due regard to comfort and safety. A collection will be taken up in aid of the Formosa Mission. The Christian public are cordially invited to attend. He will also speak in Zion Church, at 3 p. m.—Com. [2i]

SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—The 37th annual session of the National Division, recently assembled at Saratoga, appears to have been largely attended. The Provinces were represented by Sir S. L. Tiley, of New Brunswick; Rev. G. Christie, and J. Pains, Esq., of Nova Scotia; J. S. Hall, Esq., of Quebec; and G. M. Rose, Esq., and E. Craswell, Esq., of Ontario. The following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the National Division of the S. of T., of N. A., commend to the members of the order generally the "Sons of Temperance National Mutual Relief Society," which has already attained a membership of more than seven hundred.

No changes were made in constitution or laws. The next session is fixed for Concord, New Hampshire, on the 2nd Wednesday of July, 1882.
