## Strait Aerial Survey Part Causeway Study

In order to determine the direction of flow and the amount of ice in all sections of Northumberland Strait, an aerial survey is being conducted by Northumberland Consultants Ltd., Fred Brown, general manager said yesterday.

The company has been conducting studies of the strait in connection with the proposed P.E.I.-N.B. causeway since last June.

In describing the present survey, Mr. Brown said that once a plane travels "a criss-cross route" over the strait, covering about 400 miles.

It starts at the Burinouch, N.B. area, flies across to West Point, criss-crosses the strait until it gets out near Georgetown, then crosses to Malignant Cove near Antigonish, he said.

**FLMS TAKEN**  
During each trip, films are taken and later edited. With the survey lasting seven weeks — it now has three weeks left to go — the company will end up with seven consecutive views of each particular section of the strait, Mr. Brown explained.

Mr. Brown said also that the company is "about to erect an ice panel at Borden."

This device, composed of two steel panels each one inch thick

public works for examination, Mr. Brown said.

A definite date for the final decision on the type of causeway (complete causeway or causeway-tunnel) to be proposed has not yet been set.

Mr. Brown said that the location of the panel at the Borden pier may mean it will be several weeks before the results can be properly determined.

In order to give us the pressure we need, we've got to have the ice coming directly at the pier," he said. "Later, it's being going by the pier."

He said that the ideal position, for the ice panel, which is due to arrive Thursday, would have been "on the bow of the Abegweit" but that this had been found to be out of the question.

Mr. Brown said that the model of Northumberland Strait is nearing completion in St. John, N.B. He said that the reason this model is not being built in this province is because of the difficulty of finding a place to house it.

## Dealers Face Court Action

For failing to remit to the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board a levy that should have been collected on potatoes shipped out of the province, seven prices to growers and dealers are faced with court action.

Board regulations require that one cent must be collected on every 100 pounds of potatoes exported and remitted to the board for potato industry promotional work.

Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae said Monday all seven face the charge.

Four of the growers and dealers also face court action over failure to get an export license. Mr. MacRae said that two of those involved will appear in magistrate's court in Charlottetown today and the other two will appear in court in Summerside on Thursday.

It was also pointed out by Mr. MacRae that levy fees on February potato shipments "are due this week and delinquents will be sued."
