CHARLTON'S MEDICINE.

The GUARDIAN makes a commendable attempt—from the Government point of view—to "sugar-coat" a bitter pill. Mr. John Charlton is against the Government, squarely against the Government, in respect to Preferential Trade, and in respect to the free admission into Canada of United States products, such as corn; and he has declared, in effect, the truth that the Government has not tried to fulfil its promises in regard economy of expenditures, reduction of debt, etc.

In point of fact, Mr. Charlton's attack upon the Government is scarcely less effective than that of Mr. H. H. Cook, though it is not so elaborate or comprehensive. This is the more remarkable in view of the high position Mr. Charlton has held in the Liberal party. He is indeed a much abler representative than the majority of those who sit in the Cabinet. A thoughtful, silent, distant, brainy Presbyterian, when Mr. Charlton speaks his words are effective upon the minds of those who compose the Liberal party of Ontario; and his condemnation of the Government will be acquiesced in as righteous and timely by thousands upon thousands of the old Liberals throughout Canada.

The Guardian says that "his honest criticisms are likely to prove not worse than healthful medicine." But the difficulty of effecting an improvement in the Government's bad case is evident to all. However strong the medicine, Sir Wilfrid Laurier cannot, in view of his declarations in England, when he captured the Cobden Medal, advocate Mutual Preferential Trade. However strong the medicine, he cannot get rid of Tarte, Sifton and Blair and so give rise to a hope that his Government will be more economical and careful in the future than it has been in the past. No, the only medicine that will be effective for the good of the country is that which the majority of the electors will administer on the 8th of November, when they will purge the country—no price purged Parliament—by turning out the whole lot.

It is true, as stated by the Patriot, at the Conservatives of North Norfolk, we decided not to offer opposition to Mr. Charlton, it is evident that his attack upon the Government is regarded as an admission that he will give Sir Charles upper and independent support in respect to the chief points in his programme, viz, Mutual Preferential Trade, free Trade with the United States, and economy in the administration of affairs, notwithstanding the recklessness and broken promises by which the latter day Liberals in the Government are characterized.

"TRY!"

This is the one great essential to success in every undertaking.

It is admitted by men of all parties that a preference in the markets of Great Britain would be a great thing for Canada and the Empire; and many persons in Great Britain as well as in the colonies believe that Great Britain might yield the desired preference without any injury to her own interests—rather with profit.

Sir Charles is squarely in favor of such a preference,—he has worked for it in the past; he will work for it in the future. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, on the other hand, says it is "impossible."

What will the electors of Canada say about it—which leader will they follow?

Ought they not to say "we shall try,"—ought they not to vote for the Leader and the men who will try to obtain the preference which every one can see would be "a great thing for Canada?"

—Some of Mr. Bell's friends in Newton are kicking. Yes, and they have reason to kick.

—The prohibition plebiscite cost the country \$197,932. But the Prohibition vote of 1896 was captured by Tarte, Laurier & Co.

—The energetic young men of Bridalbane intend forming a local Tupper Club. The Conservatives in this section have made surprising gains.

—It is reported that Mr. J. H. Bell is making a house to house canvass. All in vain,—he cannot withstand the advancing storm of an indignant electorate.

—Sir Charles Tupper is in Toronto. On his way thither, on Friday last, he told a Montreal reporter that in his opinion the Conservatives would carry fifteen or sixteen out of the twenty seats in Nova Scotia.

—The St. John Sun sizes up the situation in this province and says: "At the beginning of the campaign the Liberal-Conservatives of Prince Edward Island claimed four seats out of the five in that province. They now expect to carry the whole Island. Mr. Stewart is opposing Sir Louis Davie, and the minister is not holding his own well. Sir Louis is hampered by his own record, and chiefly by his own unfulfilled promises. He has lost the personal popularity he had by his use of patronage. The people have lost confidence in him, and his campaign is utterly barren of enthusiasm. It is confidently expected that Prince Edward Island will send a solid delegation against the government."
