seems to have never had a name for this vegetable, and probably we have been eating mainly Ontario potatoes in the restaurant, but last year my wife who is an excellent cook obtained some Maritime potatoes and they were equally bad. While they were in our home they were indistinguishable from laundry soap. "So that some people may have an opportunity of eating a good potato at least once, I have placed sufficient in the parliamentary restaurant to supply this vegetable on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. I think this will be the first time for many people that they have tasted a decent potato." Mr. Laing suggested jokingly that Mr. Riley is a descendant of persons chased out of Ireland in 1945 and 1946 by the potato famine.
"Sorry and Unpalatable"
At noon today, Mr. Riley went to the restaurant and made a solemn test of the British Columbia potatoes. His nose wrinkled and after a valiant attempt to eat a baked B.C. tuber, he left more than half on the plate. Speaking to The Guardian afterwards, he said: "Those British Columbia potatoes compare favorably with what we send to a starch factory down home after a season of extreme blight. The potato from that Province that I honestly tried to eat was soggy and unpalatable. Worse than that, it had a sort of crust on the outside resembling the rust and scab you sometimes find on poor and poorly-cultivated potatoes.
"It's true that Mr. Laing sent me a sample of potatoes to my office and I will make an honest test of them. I will do so however with little hope of a pleasant meal."
Commenting on Mr. Laing's suggestion that his ancestors had left Ireland and come to Prince Edward Island by reason of the 1945-47 potato famine, Mr. Riley said if the Irish potatoes of a century ago were as bad as the British Columbia potatoes today, his ancestors would undoubtedly have left Ireland in any case to get away from them.
Mr. Laing complained that in the cooking, the parliamentary restaurant chef had "spoiled" his nice British Columbia potatoes. The restaurant manager, W. Jennings indignantly denied the charge, they were most carefully cooked in every way, he insisted.

ed on behalf of the Government of Prince Edward Island by the Hon. A. W. Matheson, and greetings were extended on behalf of the citizens and the City by Mayor Stewart, who also introduced Dr. Macnab.
Mayor Stewart said that after the export of brains from the brains from the Maritimes, it was indeed a pleasure to see a Maritimer as President of the Institute. Dr. Macnab, he said, was both a scholar and a workman, having truly risen from the ranks since his boyhood and youth on the New Brunswick shores of the Northumberland Straits.
In presenting the charter to Mr. Sharp, Dr. Macnab said it was a special privilege for him to do so, as P. E. I. is the last Province to be organized. He also presented a banner on behalf of the parent branch in Moncton, which will be prominently displayed at all meetings of the local branch.
Declaring that modern civilization would have been impossible, and cannot be maintained, without the work of the engineers, Dr. Macnab stated that the industrial revolution laid the foundation for the engineering of today.
In his fifty years in the profession, he has witnessed the growth of electricity, the telephone, wireless telegraphy and the automobile, with its highways, until they are now taken for granted. All this has come about through the teamwork between the scientist and the engineer, he said.
Those present, who represent the profession, Dr. Macnab stated have tremendous responsibilities. "Through atomic power, are we going to benefit or destroy civilization? To ensure the latter, the pure scientist and the engineer must work closely together."
Turning to the Canadian scene, Dr. Macnab said that the hinterlands of this country possess tremendous mineral resources, and if it is not properly developed by Canadians, someone else will take it over and do it for us. It will be largely through the engineers that this development must come about, and be done intelligently and wisely.
Expressing the hope that the P. E. I. Branch will always serve the community, Dr. Macnab concluded, "engineers graduate from the universities with a big debt to the public and by reason of our training we have a definite responsibility as individual citizens."
In acceptance of the charter, Mr. Sharp said that the future of the engineer was never brighter, with the great wealth of this country and the fact that 1,000 engineers are needed for normal replacement and growth.
In thanking Dr. Macnab for his fine address, Mr. Sharp commented on the remark by the President that P. E. I. being the last province in Canada to receive a charter was the last frontier. A note of humour was injected when Mr. Sharp, referring to the President as the "Great White Chief", presented him with a gift from the future of the branch.

Egypt May Reconsider Diplomatic Break
LONDON, Dec. 12 —(CP)—Abdel Fattah Amr Pasha, Egypt's ambassador to Britain, today was the silent centre of an international mystery. The question is whether he is being called home by his government as part of Egypt's campaign against Britain.
Early today in Cairo a government spokesman said the ambassador would be withdrawn, and warned of other measures to weaken the British position in Egypt.
Several Cairo newspapers also reported that the cabinet had decided Tuesday night to recall the ambassador in protest against demolition by British troops of a Suez Canal zone village—an action the Egyptians have called aggression.
The newspapers said a communique announcing the decision would be issued today but the day passed without a formal bulletin.
There were rumors the Egyptians might be reconsidering their decision.
In Cairo, the acting foreign minister, Ibrahim Farag Pasha, told reporters the "question of diplomatic relations with Britain" was being reviewed by the legal department of his ministry and "nothing has been decided" yet.
In London, the British Foreign Secretary, Anthony Eden, was reported to have sent a note to Egypt in an apparent effort to prevent a break. A British Foreign Office spokesman said Britain does not wish "any diminution in diplomatic contacts."
