SENTENCE COMMUTED.—We understand that the sentence of W. F. Callaghan, a prisoner in Dorchester Penitentiary, has been commuted from four years to two years. It will be remembered that Callaghan was convicted of forgery on the Frederick's Publishing Company in January, 1889.

THE WHITMAN CASE.—The Committee of the Baptist Church who have been enquiring into certain charges made against Rev. E. Whitman, have concluded their labors, and their report will be submitted to the congregation at a meeting to be held on Friday evening next. In the meantime, it would be well to suspend judgment in respect to the damaging reports which are now in circulation.

WAS VERY FAST.—The latest tale of the unsophisticated youth comes from Boston. A young man bought a \$5 horse for \$2 from a horse dealer in that city, with a written guarantee that he could trot a mile in 2.30. The sag, upon trial, made a mile in about six minutes, and the young man sued the dealer for getting money under false pretences. Of course he lost, as the dealer said the 2.30 stood for 2 hours and 30 minutes.

THE TENDER AWARDED.—The Times says that Mr. T. C. Connor, of Moncton, has received notice from Ottawa that his tender for Immigration Buildings at Halifax has been accepted. It is to be a wooden building with a pile foundation, and will cost between \$7,000 and \$8,000. Mr. Connor, it will be remembered, was one of the contractors for the erection of the new Post Office Building in Charlottetown.

INFORMATION WANTED.—A Charlottetown lady received a letter some days ago, dated from the Fire Brigade Station, Cumberland, London, England, signed "Jennie," who says she is staying with "Elias," and is "in the drapery business." A SUCCESSFUL OPERATION.—The Halifax Mail says: In a house on Grandville street a fourteen year old girl is prostrated with diphtheria. All hopes of her getting well were abandoned by the friends of the girl, her throat being closed entirely. Drs. Morrow and Goodwin were called. After mature consideration it was decided to open the throat of the girl from the outside. The flesh was cut on the outside of the throat near the wind pipe, and after a difficult operation the doctors succeeded in opening the throat from the wind pipe to the mouth. This operation was done as a last resort. To-day the young girl is doing well and hopes are entertained for her recovery.

DIED.—At Washita, Indiana Territory, March 16th, 1890, Daniel Stuart Munro, after a short illness, aged 32 years, formerly of Prince Edward Island. His wife and brother John were with him in his last moments. His remains were followed to the grave by a large crowd of friends and acquaintances.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The City of Paris Disabled.

QUEENSTOWN, March 30. The Inman Line steamer City of Paris, towed by the steamer Aldersgate, arrived at Queenstown at 4 o'clock this morning. The accident by which the City of Paris was disabled occurred on Tuesday, 216 miles west of Fastnet, and was caused by the breaking of the low pressure cylinder of the port cylinder of the port engine flying to pieces, the metal forcing the bulkhead and disabling the starboard engine. The port engine rooms were filled with upwards of 2,000 tons of water, which kept increasing in spite of the pumps. The port engine was entirely useless.

The Tariff Bill.

WASHINGTON, March 30. Chairman McKinlay of the Ways and Means Committee, announced yesterday that it would be some time before the tariff bill comes up before the House for discussion. He says it is advisable to first dispose of the pending silver bill, the discussion of which will probably consume two weeks. The tariff bill, therefore, will not come before the House before the first of May.

The School Question Again.

TORONTO, March 30. In the local House yesterday, a motion for the second reading of the bill introduced by the French, to deprive separate schools of representation on high school boards, was defeated, as also was a motion for the second reading of Creighton's bill to require members of religious orders to be certified before teaching in separate schools.

A Spy Arrested.

PARIS, March 30. A Government spy has been arrested at Epinal, the capital of the department of Vosges. Documents were found on his person showing that there exists an organized system of the French forts and camps along the Franco-German frontier.

A Formal Submission.

LISBON, March 30. The Journal de Commerce publishes Makelo's formal submission to the Portuguese authorities in East Africa. The natives express regret at the result and declare that the uprising was incited by English agents.

Shoemakers on Strike.

LONDON, March 30. Ten thousand shoemakers of this city have gone on strike to compel the masters to have their work done in the factories instead of at the homes of workmen, and to do away with the "sweating" system.

Annual Dinner.

OTTAWA, March 30. The annual dinner of the members of the House of Commons Press Gallery took place last night. Speeches were made by Messrs. Laurier, Davies, Bowell, Caron and others.

After the Tornado.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 30. Ninety-four bodies have been recovered. It is supposed that five or six more may be found in out-of-the-way places. Of the injured to a noticeable extent, the nearest estimate is 12.

An Attorney-General Resigns.

WINNIPEG, March 30. Attorney-General Martin has resigned his post-portfolio and will drop out of office on Monday. He will, however, retain his seat in the house.
