# Potato Growers Seek Production Aids

Potato producers from Western and Eastern areas of the province are planning to ask the government for financial assistance that will compensate them for low prices, and in some cases for low yields. It was learned reliably yesterday.

Meetings held in Eastern Kings County, at Elmira and Kingsboro, supported a resolution that would ask the government to pay a maximum of \$300 per acre and growers who attended several meetings in West Prince recently—a general meeting is planned at O'Leary on Friday of this week—endorsed the idea of requesting assistance up to a maximum of \$750 per grower.

The Kings County farmers asked that "steps be taken by federal and provincial governments to stimulate the price structure so a price of not less than one dollar per 70-pound bag be guaranteed on a recommended number of acres per grower to keep production in line with demand determined each year by market conditions.

The Eastern Kings people base their demand on "not less than 10 cents per 70-pound bag based on 200 bags per acre of saleable potatoes at each grower, up to and including 15 acres. The West Prince meetings endorsed the idea of a payment of \$50 per acre, up to a maximum of 15 acres, and the Federation of Agriculture has arranged, by request, the general meeting at the O'Leary hall to co-ordinate the wishes of the growers in the surrounding areas.

The Eastern Kings resolution notes that "circumstances beyond the control of potato production of about \$20 for a married family allowance is boosted to \$300 to \$250 and for other dependents to \$150 from \$100. 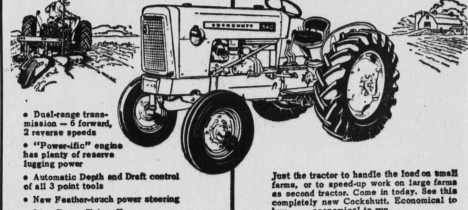
