More, M.P. for Regina, president-elect of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association stopped for a chat prior to the 26th annual meeting of the P.E.I. TB League yesterday. The meeting, which

was held at the Charlottetown Hotel, was largely attended. A number of reports on progress made during the past year were given.

There were three TB deaths in the province during 1965, the ages being 92, 81 and 75. In Blanche Conway's Seal Sale report it was noted that the 1965 Christmas Seal Campaign reached an all-time high in the League's history. The amount of \$14,633 was contributed — a seven per cent increase over the previous year. Not only was there an increase in the gross return, but the net return was much higher due to greatly decreased costs in the administration of the campaign.

## 330 Cases Of Tuberculosis Discovered By TB League

The 26th annual meeting of the P.E.I. Tuberculosis League was held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday afternoon. Chairman of the meeting was Walter Coulson of Summerside, president of the League.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by H.G. MacWilliam and the treasurer's report was given by L.J. MacLellan.

A run-down of the League's 1965 program was heard. Robert Schurman gave a report on the mass chest x-ray surveys of selected adult groups during the past year. He reminded the meeting that in 1944 mobile x-ray apparatus and a van to transport same were purchased at a cost of \$20,000. This equipment became obsolete and was replaced in 1962 at a cost of \$19,000. This chest diagnostic equipment, into which goes a high percentage of seal funds, has made it possible for 245,000 free x-rays to be taken on the people of this province; through the program 330 cases of tuberculosis have been discovered and treated. Applying the formula whereby each undiscovered case of active tuberculosis may infect 10 others, it is estimated that this program has been responsible for sparing 3,300 Islanders the experience of taking a year or more out of their lives to recover their health, and had saved in excess of \$6,000,000 of the tax payer's money over a period of 21 years.

### Council Planning Landscaping

The regular monthly meeting of the Borden Town Council was held in the council chambers with Mayor Gilbert Bell and councillors J.J. MacIsaac, A.E. Jay, Everett McKenna present.

Due to the MV Abegweit being in dry dock the other three councillors were unable to attend. The minutes of the previous meeting were adopted and bills amounting to \$503.88 were approved to be paid.

Councillor MacIsaac submitted the police report. He reported 37 convictions, 35 traffic and 2 liquor cases. Councillor Jay reported for the fire committee. He reported that the equipment that he plans to have landscaped done around the firehall soon.

Councillor McKenna, chairman of the street committee, reported that the necessary street repairs would be done as soon as the weather permits.

Action is to be taken immediately to have unsightly buildings and vacant lots cleaned up.

A donation was made to the Borden Paperweight Island A championship hockey team.

### City Woman Passes Away

The wife of N.D. MacLean, Mrs. Eva MacLean, RN, died in hospital yesterday morning following an illness of about two weeks. Mr. MacLean is the administrator at the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

Mrs. MacLean, the former Eva Murdock was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David P. Murdock of Murray Harbor. Mrs. MacLean was prominent in music circles in the city and assisted actively in many charitable causes.

A member of the Kirk of St. James she took a prominent part in many organizations. Mrs. MacLean was a graduate of the Prince Edward Island Hospital School of Nursing and was an active member of the alumni. For a number of years she taught First Aid for the Red Cross, and was a staunch worker in the Rainbow Club of Sunset Lodge. She was a former member of the Y's Menettes.

### Income Figures Are Released

OTTAWA — Average income of Prince Edward Island families in 1961 was \$4,436, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics has reported in its latest compilation of information compiled by the 1961 census.

The figure was compiled from a 20 per cent sample of private non-farm dwellings taken. The PEI average compares with \$4,284 in Newfoundland, \$4,774 for Nova Scotia, \$4,617 for New Brunswick and \$6,293 for British Columbia, which had the highest average.

Of a total of 10,692 PEI families in the sampling, 432 had no incomes or incomes under \$1,000; \$1,144 between \$1,000 and \$2,000; 2,694 between two and three thousand; 2,254 between three and four; 1,671 between four and five; 1,841 between five and seven; 1,083 between \$7,000 and \$15,000 and 173 over \$15,000.

James Reginald Bruce, Lymburn, and Clifford Wilfred Larkin, Armadale, were each charged with escaping from Riverside Hospital where they had been remanded for observation. The two were remanded to Queens County Jail to May 13th. Counsel for Larkin is Frank Sigsworth. Bruce is unrepresented.

### Kensington Board Anticipates Need

SUMMERSIDE — Austin Pendergast, chairman of the board of trustees of Kensington Regional High School, has announced that in anticipation of the need for a site for a consolidated elementary school building, they have obtained purchase options on two lots of land adjoining the high school property, totalling 11 acres. They were obtained from Russell MacKay and Louis Gorman.

The move is made in conjunction with a province-wide trend to consolidate elementary schools and in accordance with a request in September, 1965, by the department of education that all regional high school boards should examine their own areas and recommend a plan suitable for their own particular area.

### \$25 Penalty Is Imposed

The Kensington board feels that one consolidation for the region would be the most desirable, with the integration of the present Kensington Elementary School helping in keeping the need for new building to a minimum.

It was emphasized that these options do not constitute a final decision to buy land or to build a school but will simply guarantee that a desirable site will be available if and when the various districts decide to set up an administration to operate a consolidated elementary school system.
