## Robinson Supplies Extend Facilities

Robinson Supplies Limited extended its facilities with the opening this morning of a new supply center on the St. Peter's Road in Parkdale. Col. F.W. Robinson, company owner, arrived in the province this morning to attend the official opening at nine o'clock.

The store was officially opened by Fred Walton, chairman of the Parkdale Village Commissioners, in a ribbon-cutting ceremony at the front entrance of the building facing St. Peter's Highway. On hand for the ceremony was Frank MacDonald, store manager; Norman MacLeod, contractor from the firm of Williams, Murphy and MacLeod and Col. Robinson.

Store manager Mr. MacDonald of Charlottetown, a native of Little Pond who has been with the company for 20 years, opened the first Island branch of Robinson Supplies Limited on Grafton Street East in 1949. Mr. MacDonald first began working with the company in other Maritime branches following the war.

Since that time Robinson Supplies had moved to the Currie building in January, 1951, and operated from the basement of the store until the building was completed in June of that year.

A gradual increase in customers and rapid expansion of Robinson Supplies Limited, has necessitated the construction of the most modern supply branch of the company in the Maritimes. Featured in the new building, which is about four times the size of their previous establishment on the corner of Kent and Queen Streets, is a complete coverage of automobile parts for all makes of cars, trucks and tractors.

During the dinner meeting the guest pupils read their essays which were listened to by the Lions. After Lion Phil Bower spoke on the essay contest, King Lion Blake Wood presented the pupils with their prizes. ### Assault Case Is Adjourned

Provincial magistrate James R. Johnson adjourned both cases to June 3 when Alfred Wellington MacNeill, city, appeared on charges of assault causing bodily harm and unlawfully confining a woman in Queens Co. Magistrate's Court Wednesday morning. The accused requested the adjournment as he had not yet been able to obtain a lawyer.

The charge of theft of an article valued at less than \$50 formerly laid against Edison Walter Strickland of Clinton was dismissed. Counsel for the accused was Gordon Tweedy.

Malcolm Edward Stewart Vernon River, charged with assault pleaded not guilty to the charge and had his case adjourned to June 22. Counsel for the accused is Gordon Tweedy.

The case of Edward John Louther of Cavendish charged with erecting a building without first obtaining a permit was adjourned to June 3 at 3:30. Counsel for the accused is John Nicholson.

John Darrell MacInnis of Savage Harbor was fined \$100 and costs on a charge of impaired driving. Counsel for the accused was Lester O'Donnell.

Erwin Joseph Malone, North Rustico, was fined \$20 and costs on a charge of creating a disturbance in a restaurant in North Rustico.

Some 88 pupils took part in the tests.

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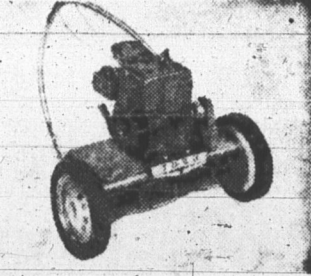

## City Resident To Penitentiary

Maurice Gordon Williams, city, was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary by acting Magistrate Gerald Foster, QC, in city police court yesterday morning. The accused was found guilty of break and entry with intent to commit an indictable offence, the charge arising from a recent break at MacKinnon's Lobster Pound on Lower Queen Street.

Before passing sentence, Mr. Foster said the case had given him a great deal of concern. The Crown had previously asked for a sentence of two years.

Tuesday morning and Mr. Williams at that time said, "I could do 18 months in Queens County jail."

Lloyd Adrian MacDonald of Charlottetown was convicted on a charge of damaging property and was fined \$50 and costs on 10 days.

DAMAGE CASE

Crown evidence in the case was given by Lenhal McCabe, Charlottetown taxi driver, who said he saw the accused snap two-side-view mirrors of a 1963 Chevrolet parked on Queen Street. The car was owned by Walter Ferguson, 27 Kensington Road.

Police Chief Sterns Webster said his department "appreciates the co-operation it gets from the taxi drivers of this city."

Found guilty on charges of driving without due care and attention, and disorderly conduct, a resident from Alberton was fined \$50 and costs on each charge.

Francis Heath Proffitt was convicted on evidence from Constable Gerard MacIntyre who stated the accused used abusive language when asked to provide identification when he stopped last evening at the foot of lower Queen Street. In respect to the charge of driving without due care and attention, the policeman said the accused failed to stop for two red traffic lights during the supper rush hour (about five o'clock) when traffic was heavy.

"You are very lucky you are not charged with criminal negligence," said Magistrate Foster.

### Hospital Campaign Scheduled

At a recent meeting of the Advisory Committee and Board of Trustees of the Kings County Memorial Hospital, Montague, it was decided to start the fund-raising campaign on June 15th and to close July 15th. The canvass of the Montague merchants will commence on June 1st.

As the cost of new equipment purchases and capital costs expenditures are not paid for by the Hospital Services Commission and the necessity of the purchase of a new X-ray Machine, it is imperative that the campaign for funds be successful. The cost of this Machine is expected to be in the vicinity of \$15,000. For this reason the objective has been set at \$2000, an increase of \$2000 over last year.

On a number of occasions during the past year the facilities of the Hospital have been taxed to full capacity.
