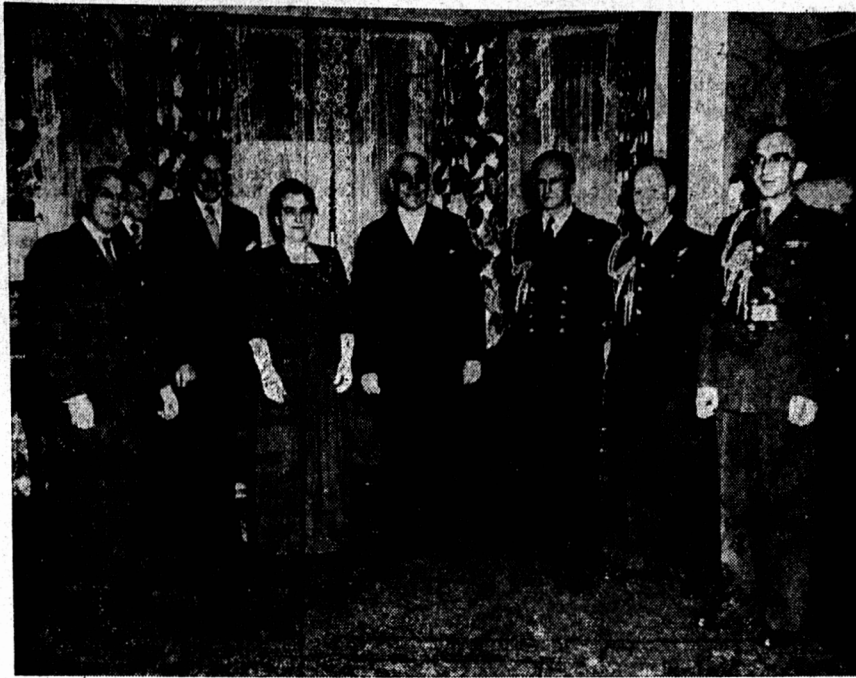

### Lubrication Of Farm Machinery

OTTAWA—Good maintenance of farm equipment requires the careful selection and correct and regular use of suitable lubricants. Costly precision built machines or parts, such as tractor and thrashing cylinder bearings justify the use of good quality lubricants, even though they may cost a little more, points out H. J. Kemp, who is in charge of

machinery and equipment development at the Dominion Experimental Station, Saanichton, B. C.

Generally lubricants are obtained from three main sources, and are classed as animal, vegetable and mineral. Lard, tallow and fish oils supply animal oils. Cotton seed, rape seed, flax seed, castor beans and olives are examples of vegetable oils. Mineral oils are obtained from crude petroleum. Different kinds of lubricants are obtained by combining and blending these three types of oil.

The combining of animal, vegetable, mineral oils and other ingredients is not a hit and miss arrangement. All high grade lubricants today are the outcome of research by scientists and engineers and other institutions. Many factors which complicate lubrication have made this necessary. Various loads or pressures, speeds, temperatures, chemical action, design and manner of operation or working parts, high and low grade fuels, exposure to dust or grit, are a few of the problems which lubricants are designed to meet. The conditions under which most farm equipment must operate are not ideal from an engineering standpoint, but manufacturers of farm implements and their designers have provided satisfactory methods for

lubricating their machines. For this reason, the lubrication instructions supplied by the implement manufacturer should be followed closely. Oil companies also supply much valuable information as to kinds of oil and their correct use. The Agriculture Engineering Department of Universities and the Dominion Experimental Farms Service may also be consulted.

**CITY POLICE COURT**—At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday, a man charged with false pretenses was sentenced to 20 days suspended, while a man charged with common assault was remanded until January 11th. A man charged with taking a motor vehicle without the owners consent (joy riding) was remanded until January 8th. A drunk and disorderly and a drunk and incapable were also remanded until the 11th.

**GORMERLY APPEAL DISMISSED**—The conviction of Maurice Gormerly by Stipendiary Magistrate K. M. Martin on Sept. 20, 1928 was upheld yesterday by the Court of Criminal Appeal. Gormerly had been sentenced to three years in Dorchester Penitentiary for breaking and entering and theft from Carvell Bros. warehouse. The judgment of the appeal court was delivered by Mr. Justice Tweedy, the two other members concurring. The appellant, he said, is a chronic offender, but his derelictions appear to be the result of an abnormal condition which arises upon the use of intoxicants. In view of this circumstance, the court has adjourned the hearing of the appeal from time to time. It was ordered that time served in Queen's County jail pending the determination of the appeal should count as part of the original sentence. Counsel for the Crown were Mr. G. R. Holmes (now Prothonotary) and Mr. J. P. Nicholson. Mr. L. P. O'Donnell acted for the appellant.
