SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.—In today's issue appears the advertisement of the Summer School of Science, which meets in this city for the first time. This is the eighth session of the school. It has been liberally patronized in previous years by the teachers of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and should receive a large patronage this year from the teachers and others of this Province. Teachers, with the consent of their trustees, may take an additional week's holidays to attend the school, the additional time being allowed by the Educational Department. Among the distinguished instructors who will be at the school, will be the celebrated Dr. McClure, of Denver, Colorado.

A BATCH OF FATALITIES.—The Halifax Herald says: Last year a young man named Armstrong, while alone in his father's house at Fourchu, was accidentally shot while trying to extract the charge of powder and shot from the muzzle of his gun. The full charge entered his head, killing him instantly. His body was returned to his mother from a neighbor. A few months after the mother died of a "broken heart" as the result of her only son's death. Some days ago the father, while cutting firewood, was struck by a falling limb of a tree and instantly killed. Thus in less than a year, son, mother and father disappeared from this "vale of tears."

LOVE IN LUXENBURG.—A young gentleman paid his best girl a visit last Sunday evening. As they understood each other, the young lady awaited herself at the privilege allowed her, and sat on his knee. After the young man's departure, she was somewhat surprised to find that her evening dress (now of colored one) was much soiled. A closer look, and to her amazement she discovered the discoloration was caused by shoe-blacking. Yesterday, on being told of the matter the young man in a rather shamefaced manner admitted that the knees of his pants were worn nearly through and had a shiny appearance and he had used the blacking brush to cover the defect.—Luxemburg Argus.

NEWS NOTES.

Winnipeg, according to its new city directory, has 35,500 people.

It is proposed to expend over \$150,000 on its property at Cochran hall.

The cutter Valkyrie, formerly owned by the Earl of Dunraven, has been wrecked on the west coast of Africa, and all hands on board have been lost.

A walking match between a meat-eater and a vegetarian, the course being from Berlin to Friedrichsruhe, 270 kilometers, was won by the meat-eater.

The British commission to the World's fair at Chicago reports on the gathering that it is the most successful in conception, splendid in execution and successful in results.

The Cochran Hill Gold Mining company has opened up another large belt of quartz on its property at Cochran hall. The new find is south of the main shaft, and shows well in gold.

A Winnipeg paper says that the Manitoba Government will shortly give a substantial bonus to the C. P. R. to build a road to Daughin. The settlers have long been agitating for a road.

Upon the application of Lieutenant-Governor Schultz, the Minister of Militia has caused to be forwarded to Winnipeg one of the pieces of the ordinance in store, to be mounted at Fort Osborne. This is to serve as a time gun and will be fired by electricity at noon every day.

Sir Henry John Wrixson, member of the Legislative Assembly and ex-Attorney-General of Victoria, and Messrs. Simon Fraser and Nicholas Fitzgerald, members of the Legislative Council, have left Melbourne, Australia, for Ottawa, Canada, to represent the colony of Victoria.

Mr. Labilliere, a prominent member of the Colonial Institute, writes a letter to the Times in which he argues that the new British death duties are practically a tax on colonial property in the case of money invested in the colonies, and he writes that the whole question is worthy of discussion at the coming inter-Imperial Conference at Ottawa.

Some idea of the extent of the British possessions in South Africa may be gathered from the fact that the distance between Cape Town and Fort Salisbury, in Mashonaland, is 1,600 miles. A railroad extends north from the Cape to Vryburg, 774 miles, leaving 26 miles to be traversed by post cart or by wagon. Arrangements have lately been made for building another great extension of the railroad. When this is done the journey may be taken with few and trifling inconveniences.

In his speech on Prohibition in the Commons, Dr. Plint, of Yarmouth, N. S., gave some interesting statistics regarding the liquor traffic. He observed that no less than \$40,000,000 worth of liquors and beer was consumed in Canada every year. The capital invested in this immense business in the Dominion amounts to \$8,500,000 in the one hundred and sixty-two breweries, and \$7,054,000 in the eight distilleries. The number of employees is set down at 2,243, representing about 15,000 persons. The amount paid in wages is \$1,070,000. The value of the total output of distilleries and breweries is stated to be \$7,916,000 per year.

Mr. Cecil Rhodes, the energetic Premier of South Africa, is not content with his earlier and more recent conquests. It seems certain that he has dreams of opening communication under the British flag across the African continent from Cape Town to Cairo. He will not stop with the projected telegraph line, but will seek to build a boulevard along the whole route. There are many difficulties in the way of the scheme. Besides the natural obstacles, growing out of climate, topography, etc. But the English are a very pushing people.

The watchful care which Mrs. Gladstone continually exercises over the health and comfort of her distinguished husband is the subject of frequent comment among her intimates. Possessed of a forceful intellect and strong womanly sympathies, she uses these characteristics, such as they are, to make the ex-premier think of the cleverest woman in the world. Out of all the members of her household she alone knows just how to manage her venerable husband, who in recent years has occasionally manifested a disposition to indulge in what would be regarded as tantrums in less distinguished life. On one occasion recently a leading London journal, while writing of the scheme, got into a heated argument with the sage of Hawarden over some question of public policy. While the discussion was at its acme, Mrs. Gladstone, who was sitting in the hand of the daring newspaper man. On it were the words written in Mr. Gladstone's large, angular hand: "We never contradict Mr. Gladstone." The visitor then, for the first time, noticed that the grand old man was flushed and excited look. He at once took the hint, and after feebly contending the points for a few moments, he confessed himself worsted and peace was restored.

A PEOPLE IN DARKNESS.

Sir,—I noticed in last Monday's paper that you called the attention of Mr. Peters to the way in which the people of the south side of the Hillsborough are treated with regard to the questions of lights on the Ferry Wharf. No doubt, it is disgraceful. When one looks over to the Steam Navigation Company's Wharf, and sees them lighted with electric lights, it does seem strange that our Government would go back to the age of oil lamps. Although the Charlottetown wharf is bad, the Southport side is worse. All the light that they have had there this year was one oil lamp three weeks only.

Now, sir, I trust that the Government is not waiting until some valued lives are lost. There was surely warning enough last fall when two young men lost their lives by drowning at that wharf. The Government, then, were not all action and attention. Not only were more lights placed upon the wharf, but a watchman was put in charge of it. You must remember that that was before the election. Now they are all busy drawing their salaries, and the people must trust along in the darkness until the day of the next general election. But perhaps that election is not so far off as Mr. Peters thinks. Apart from politics, it is decidedly dangerous the way things are. I have occasion to cross the ferry every week and my hair stands on end when I see a crowd of young children running around the wharf at Southport, jumping from one place to another and no one in charge of the place at all. I trust that the Government will be done before it is too late. BERNARD.
