Local and Other Items.

THE ANNANDALE.—It is expected that the steamer Annandale will have completed taking in oats by Saturday night.

GOSE TO THE ASYLUM.—Peter Martin, the unfortunate young man who figured at the police court yesterday, was last evening committed to the Hospital for the Insane.

HAZELBROCK FACTORY.—The factory at Hazelbrook began making cheese on Saturday. There were about 12000 lbs. of milk received and 16 cheese made. This is a very good day's work.

IN A BAD WAY.—The attention of the Commissioner of Public Works is called to the condition of the bridge on Johnstons River known as the Red or Lower Bridge. It is positively unsafe, and should be attended to at once.

OVER THE WHARF.—A horse belonging to Mr. Thomas Brooks, truckman, fell over the ferry wharf last evening about half-past six. After being in the water about an hour the horse was landed at Poole's wharf, apparently not much the worse for his experience.

POLICE COURT.—Two summonses alleging violations of the Liquor Regulation Act were enforced into this morning. Peter Coyle's case was adjourned until this day week for judgment. The summons against John Joy was dismissed.

NEW SIGNS.—Mr. W. W. Clark, agent for the Plant Steamship Line, has had new and attractive signs put up at his place of business on the corner of Water and Queen Streets. The signs have been painted in Mr. Crossman's usual good style.

ST. DUNSTON'S CATHEDRAL.—The Sacrament of Confirmation will be administered to about 135 candidates to-morrow afternoon at three o'clock by His Lordship, Bishop Macdonald. In the morning at half past seven about 130 children will approach the Holy Table for the first time.

CHANGE OF WHARF.—The Plant Line Company have leased Poole's wharf, and beginning with her next trip the Halifax will hereafter be berthed there. The company are erecting a large warehouse on the wharf in addition to the commodious one already there. Shippers will have lots of warehouse accommodation.

SEARCHING FOR A HUSBAND.—Princess Tolo Mariani, of the Fiji Islands, is about to visit Europe, in search of a husband. She is the heir to the throne, has an income of \$35,000 a year from the British Government, which will be doubled on her accession, besides her domain lands, and is looking for a well educated man of good birth, as the Fiji Queen's consort is her chief Minister and Chief Justice. — Berlinblatt.

A SMUGGLER SEIZED.—The cruiser Stanley arrived at Hawkesbury, C. B., at daylight on Monday morning with the French schooner Marie Eugenie, of St. Pierre, M. q., in tow, she having been seized on Sunday by Inspector Jones at Margaree Island with contraband cargo on board. The Stanley has only been a few days in commission, having been transferred to the customs service on Saturday. The cargo consisted of brandy, gin and tobacco.

INQUEST.—The inquest in view of the body of Allan McInnis was concluded last evening. Dr. Kelly, who made the post mortem examination, was the only witness examined. His evidence went to show that McInnis was in a low state of health at the time of his death. The verdict returned by the jury was as follows: "That the deceased Allan McInnis came to his death from congestion of the lungs induced by exposure to cold, the said congestion being complicated by an already-existing diseased condition of the heart."

INSURANCE DISCUSSION.—A discussion regarding the relative merits of old line insurance companies and the Independent Order of Foresters' insurance company, took place in the Foresters' Hall last evening in the presence of a goodly number of Foresters and other citizens. Mr. J. K. Ross, Provincial Manager of the North American Life Insurance Company represented the first mentioned plan and Mr. L. U. Fowler, High Secretary of the Independent Order of Foresters, upheld the other. Both schemes were well supported.
