### GOOD MEETING AT MARSHFIELD

**Messrs McCourt, McLean and Palmer Were Present.**

PREMIER FARQUHARSON AND MR. CUMMISKEY

**Though Invited Were Conspicuous For Their Absence.**

### THE MEETING.

The meeting at Marshfield last night was not so largely attended as it would have been had the weather been favorable. Mr. Stinson, President of the Farmer's Club, presided, and Mr. Gibson, secretary of the Club, acted in that capacity for the meeting.

The secretary read a statement of local and general requirements, which the candidates were asked to discuss and subscribe to in writing. The statement called for a Professor of Agriculture on the Stock Farm and in Prince of Wales College, first-class cold storage for this Province, the making of reverberating and improved road system, and rebuilding of Appletree Wharf.

These matters were discussed by Mr. P. McCourt, Mr. H. J. Palmer, Mr. T. A. McLean, Mr. F. Turner, Senator Ferguson and others.

The document binds the candidates to do all in their power to further the objects set forth therein, and it was subscribed to by the opposition candidates.

The meeting was an excellent one and showed that the Farmers Club of Marshfield is alive to its interests.

After singing Auld Lang Syne the meeting closed.
