Mobile Blood Team Here For Clinics This Week

The new familiar convoy of three blue Red Cross blood transfusion vehicles from the Maritime Depot at Halifax arrived in Summerside last evening with its full complement of workers who will, with the assistance of volunteers in each locality, conduct clinics at five centres during the first four days of this week. The objective for this week's four days of clinics is the most ambitious yet undertaken in this Province as 2,000 donors are being sought. This large-sized objective is necessary because the Province is at the present time more than 500 bottles in debt to the Maritime Depot. In order to cancel this debt and establish a credit of 1,500 bottles to take care of the next six months' needs of patients in Island hospitals where an average of 250 bottles of blood per month, 2,000 donors are absolutely necessary. Undoubtedly, Prince Edward Islanders in their usual responsive manner, will take this matter seriously and respond accordingly.

Enthusiastic committees working in each of the centres in which clinics are to be held—the R.C.A.F. Station, Summerside itself, Craipud, North Rustico and Charlottetown, all report good response to their appeals for donors. If a steady flow of donors can be maintained at the afternoon clinics, there should be no overcrowding at the evening sessions, and this will avoid the long waits that occur when all decide to come in the early evening.

CHESS DISPLAY LARGEST

TORONTO (CP)—The largest simultaneous chess display ever held in Canada was staged at the University of Toronto's Hart House Thursday night with two Canadian masters playing 100 contestants.

S'ide Worker Critically Injured On Pulp Steamer

Alan Gallant, about 17, of Summerside, was seriously injured Saturday morning when struck by a pulpwheel which slipped from a sling being lowered into the hold of the "Hegra" which loaded about 400 cords before sailing for Souris early yesterday morning.

The injured youth was working in the hold of the ship about 8:30 on Saturday morning when a sling containing a cord of pulpwheel tilted as it was about to be lowered into the ship. Spilling downward into the hold below, some of the pulp logs struck Gallant as he stood at the bottom of the hold waiting for the sling to be lowered.

Dr. Hubert MacNeill was immediately summoned and had the unconscious man removed to Prince County Hospital where it was found that he suffered a fractured skull, together with pressure on the brain due to haemorrhage within the skull. Further injuries included a broken shoulder.

On Saturday night his condition worsened due to paralysis of the left arm and leg, and the patient received surgical attention to relieve the paralysis.

Yesterday afternoon, by charter aircraft he was flown to Halifax where he will be under the care of Dr. Stevenson, a Halifax brain specialist.

Gallant had not regained consciousness last evening, and his condition was still considered to be serious.

He is the son of Mrs. Annie Gallant, and the late Walter Gallant of North Market Street in Summerside.

Port Activity Continues At High Level In S'ide

Activity on the Summerside waterfront continued over the weekend as the "Hegra" cleared port yesterday morning after loading about 400 cords of pulpwheel. This ship was proceeding to Souris and Mulgrave to complete her cargo which is destined for France.

The "Union Mariner", a large Chinese ship, is presently loading about 80,000 bags of potatoes for MacFarlane Produce Co., and the loading of these potatoes will be completed tonight or tomorrow when the ship will sail for Florida.

Two Government ships, the "Brant" and the "Cygnus", were also docked at Summerside over the weekend.

Three more ships are expected shortly at Summerside—a pulp boat to load for P. E. I. Produce Co., is expected about Tuesday, a potato boat for MacFarlane Produce is due on Thursday, and a fertilizer boat for Canada Packers will arrive sometime the latter part of the week.
