flow could not be accommodated either at Queen Charlotte High or at Prince Street School.

OTHER STATEMENTS Mrs. Mark Malone, a former teacher with experience in London, England, expressed the opinion that Spring Park was not getting its just share for the money expended since the Unit was formed. She pointed out that in the rural areas all of them had gotten new schools while Spring Park was struggling along with an 85 year old building which had reached its limit in so far as extensions were concerned. Questioned as to the water and sewage supply, Mrs. Malone said that their problem was much worse than Parkdale.

Mr. Edmund Arsenault, chairman of Spring Park Commissioners, said that he was not speaking in his official capacity but rather as a private citizen. He felt that one of the complaints of Spring Park was that they did not have enough representation on the trustees board regarding the general population of the district. When asked if he would favour a plan of subsidization, provided the taxes would not go up, he said that he was in favor of such a plan.

Mr. Arsenault said there was a feeling among the people that they had lost control of the district by not having a say in what expenditures or assessments were to be made. He spoke of excessive costs involved in the building of certain schools within the Unit all of which was adding to the tax burden of the individual.

Mr. Lorne Burke, one of the Village Commissioners said that there was a lot of resentment among the ratepayers regarding the manner in which the Unit was formed. He stated that they had gone to a public hearing where farmers would find it difficult to pay.

Mrs. Gates felt that the Government should subsidize any additional building program adding "It was their experiment and it is up to them to see it through." When questioned by Judge Darby how the district would feel outside the Unit with a debt of \$27,000 to pay and face the prospect of immediate building of another room, she agreed they would be better off inside the Unit than outside of it.

Mr. Wilbur Trainor said he was secretary of West Royalty District at the time the Unit was formed. He explained that those who were called to the meeting could not get any information. They were told that they were going to see it through. "When I liked it or not," the ratepayers had no say in it," he said. Mr. Trainor said he was in favour of remaining within the Unit providing all the other districts did likewise.

Mrs. Willard Lank, president of the Home and School Association said that she didn't vote at the Plebiscite because she did not fully understand the question asked on the ballot. "I knew what we had, with the Unit, but I was unaware of what we would have without it," said Mrs. Lank. She felt that the people should have been better informed as to what they were voting on. The presence of a music teacher was one of the advantages in belonging to the Unit, pointed out by Mrs. Lank.

Other speakers were Mrs. Earl Norrie who felt that matters would not be remedied by building a new high school and Mr. Lorne Good who stated that if the Unit is broken up they would be taking a backward step of 20 years. He said he was 100% in favour of retaining the Unit.

Judge Darby thanked those appearing before the Commission, pointing out that it was only by receiving the opinion of private individuals that they could arrive at a decision in the matter. He assured them that all the points brought out would be given careful consideration by the Commission.

I can think of no better tribute to them than to cite the recent words of Pope Pius the twelfth, 'Never, we believe, never in the course of the history of humanity have events required on the part of woman so much initiative and daring, so much sense of responsibility, so much fidelity, moral strength, spirit of sacrifice and endurance of all kinds of sufferings—in a word, so much heroism.'"

Valedictorian Mary Rose MacDonald gave an intelligent and thoughtful address with ease and grace. Her remarks stressed the feeling of dedication that she and her classmates felt and the duty that they would meet with courage and faith. The importance of the graduating exercise to herself and the group was mentioned and members of the audience paid rapt attention to her message.
