Fire In Royal York Hotel Puts 80 Guests To Flight

TORONTO (CP)—A fire broke out on the sixth floor of the Royal York Hotel here early Saturday, causing an estimated \$33,000 damage and sending 80 guests streaming into the lobby and out onto the street.

The fire, believed to have started by someone smoking in bed, destroyed a third-floor bedroom occupied by a man and a woman.

Police said the fire started in a rooming house on the sixth floor of the hotel. It is actually the sixth. The lower convention floors are not numbered.

Damage, estimated at \$32,000, to the building and \$3000 to furnishings, was confined to about four rooms. All 22 floors in the hotel, the largest in the Commonwealth, were evacuated. The building, at Front

and York Streets in downtown Toronto, contains more than 1000 suites and 1,600 bedrooms.

Among those forced to evacuate their rooms was Jim Trimble, coach of Montreal Alouettes, and his entire club, the team was here to meet Toronto Argonauts Saturday night at an Eastern Football Conference game.

Also on the guest list were nightclub singer Dorothy Dandridge and actress Sherrine North.

Four persons were taken to hospital for treatment and later released.

TRAINER OVERCOME

SCORES OF FIERY CROSSES SENT Racial Violence Flares Across Southwestern U.S.

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Racial violence flared in the southern United States during the weekend, leaving one dead and several persons injured and scores of burning crosses dotted across the countryside.

A rash of incidents were reported in Jackson, Miss., Saturday night, while other mobs to flare-ups occurred at Greenwood, Miss., and Albany, Ga.

Most of the cross burnings were in Louisiana and Mississippi.

"We figured we'd get \$20,000 from the bank, but I guess we got more than I figured on."

De Gaulle Has Nuclear Appeal

ST. RAPHAEL, France (AP) — President de Gaulle took advantage Saturday of an anniversary marking the successful Allied landing on the Riviera 20 years ago during the Second World War to sound again his call for an independent French nuclear force.

On Aug. 15 two decades ago the American 38th, 45th and 3rd Divisions—with a token force of French armored troops and British paratroopers—operated a second front in the liberation of France which hastened the downfall of Nazi Germany.

Girl's Survival Caled 'Miracle'

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — A nine-year-old girl was rescued from a fog-shrouded sandbar in the St. Joseph River here Saturday when she had been tossed, bound and gagged, from a bridge by an abductor.

Neighbors attracted by the child's screams and cries during a chin-deep water crying: "Please help me."

She was held in a terrifying night in which her abductor had rapped twice and forced her to lie in the trunk of his car for 12 hours, said police Captain Harmon.

A man fitting the description provided by the child was seized by police who stopped his car after a brief chase in the downtown area. He was described as a 35-year-old self-employed tree-trimmer with a record of child molesting who had served terms in the Indiana State Prison for larceny.

He was held on preliminary charges of kidnapping and rape, but Harmon declined to release his identity, pending investigation.

Harmon said it was a miracle the girl survived the ordeal. Her life apparently was saved when she tumbled into the sand bar about the 21-foot Bertrand Road Bridge, seven miles north of here beyond the Indiana-Michigan state line.

British Actor Vj Oliver Dies Suddenly During Play

JOHANNESBURG (AP) — Victor Oliver, British actor and television performer who was once a law Winston Churchill's son-in-law, collapsed and died Saturday night during the final performance of a production of "The Merchant of Venice" at the Grand Theatre here.

Oliver failed to make his entrance for the second act of the play and a callboy found him on the floor of his dressing room in the theatre.

The cause of death was not known.

Oliver was formerly married to Churchill's daughter, Sarah, from whom he was divorced in 1954.

He was a comedian and a serious musician. Although Churchill made his wealthy, friends said Oliver remained at heart a musician. He was conductor of the British Concert Orchestra from 1945.
