Until the new field across from Memorial Field is ready to accept shape teams will just work out for one hour. It is hoped of course that this class of players will be recruited within a couple of days.

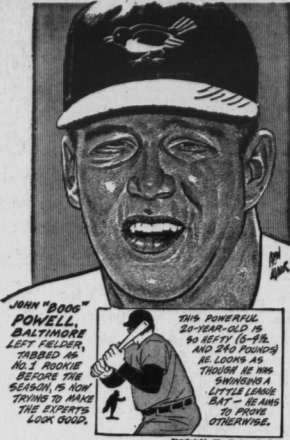

Committee To Correct Memorial Cup Situation

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association agreed Tuesday that its Memorial Cup playoffs are being run too one-sided and set up a committee to correct the situation.

Delegates to the CAHA's annual meeting approved the action after president Jack Rossburgh said that Western Canada teams can't compete on even footing with the East in junior finals because of population differences.

He said also that the eastern final between Hamilton Red Wings and Quebec Citadelles was "too one-sided that I was almost ashamed to present the trophy to Hamilton."

Rod Wings, Ontario champions, won in straight games against Quebec and then went on to win the best of seven Memorial Cup final against Edmonton in five games.

Calibre varies
The calibre of junior hockey varies too greatly across the country, he said. As an example, he said he would have "hated to see" the Maritime or British Columbia winner come up against Hamilton.

Rossburgh said that CAHA attempts to strengthen western teams by allowing them to pick up six players is not working out and that other ways must be found to make the finalists more evenly matched.

He said one way to improve inter-branch play might be to allow only a limited number of teams—those sponsored by NHL clubs—to compete for the Memorial Cup. Others could play for another trophy.

Delegates, however, seemed opposed to this idea. Frank Dillo, secretary-registry of the Montreal branch, said sponsorship of Junior A teams by NHL clubs "killed" competitive junior hockey in Quebec.
