Jottings From a Journal;

—OR—

Four Weeks on the Continent of

Europe in the Month of

September, 1878.

FIFTH LETTER.

DEAR —, Below Bonn, the banks of

the Rhine are low and rather uninteresting,

so we shall hurry on to Cologne. The

"bridge of boats" opens and we pass

through. All is bustle and confusion on

the quay. We call a cabman and drive to

the Hotel du Nord, pleasantly situated not

far from the Cathedral.

The Cathedral is a magnificent Gothic

edifice. Its foundation stone was laid in

1248; and for two centuries and a half the

work was carried on. But in 1449 it was sus-

sended, and not resumed again until quite

late. The work of renovation was begun

in 1823. Mr. Voigtel, the present architect

of the Cathedral, expects that the work will

be completed in three years time. In a

yard adjoining the edifice, numbers of work-

men may be seen busily employed cutting

the stone. £15,000 have been annually

expended during the last 36 years. The

proceeds of a lottery, subscriptions, so-

ciety, etc., have brought the total sum

expended between 1842 and 1876 up to the

enormous sum of £700,000. The Cathedral

is in a cruciform shape. Its total length,

444 ft.; height of central tower 357 ft. In the
