STOCK BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION.

(Continued From the Fifth Page.)

all the others combined. Certainly, he contended, Parliament and the Legislature should encourage the exhibitions and all other practicable means of promoting our farmers' interests. In England retired professional men farm at a loss in order to get social standing; and the farmers of Canada, too, should hold their heads up. If the country is not prosperous; grass will grow on the streets of the town.

Professor Grisdale replied to the toast by describing the system of shallow cultivation and rotation recently adopted in Ontario. The rotation is one of five years. In the first the land is ploughed in the autumn, shallow—not deeper than 3 1/2 or 4 inches, in furrows about twelve inches wide, and harrow; after the weeds have started cut up with a disc-harrow; late in the fall ridge up in ridges about 21 inches apart and 8 inches high; next year seed with oats or other grain, sowing clover seed. In the second year after the crop is off let the clover grow for a while, and then plough down; in the spring manure and cultivate for roots or corn, keeping the good soil at the top. In the third year, after the root crop is off, ridge up the soil; and the next year sow grain with clover and timothy; in the fourth year take hay; and in the fifth pasture. By this rotation it has been found that the fertility of the soil is restored and good results obtained.

The toast to the Maritime Stock Breeders' Association brought up Mr. Archibald, Mr. Fawcett and Mr. Callbeck, all of whom responded in neat and appropriate speeches.

The toast to "Sister Organizations" was responded to by Mr. Raynor, of Ontario, and Provincial Exhibitions by F. L. Haszard, Esq., and President Elderkin; the Press by Mr. W. L. Cotton and Mr. R. McDonald; the Ladies by Mr. C. A. Archibald. In the "wee sma hours ayant the twal" the company separated after singing "God Save the Queen."

The meeting of the Stock Breeders Association on Thursday forenoon was called to order by President Elderkin, at half-past ten o'clock. There was a good attendance of members of the Association.

Mr. Elderkin thanked the Association for the honor conferred in re-electing him as President. In referring to the nomination of Mr. F. L. Hodgson he said he was delighted to know that he would be officially connected with the association. He wished on behalf of the association to thank Mr. Haszard for the interest taken in connection with holding the present session in this province.
