NOTES AND RECORDS

—There is some complaint about the lax and illegal sale of liquor in Charlottetown notwithstanding the recent passage of the Prohibition law. We hope that Inspector Campbell has been attending strictly to his duties.

—An English company has obtained a controlling interest in works that supply 75 per cent. of the explosives used in Canada. They will undoubtedly inaugurate a new era in the powder business of this country.

—In the States, it seems to be generally conceded that the free silver plank will have the effect of placing the Democrats on the defensive. The country is prosperous, and the business interests of the country will fight against disturbance, while the advocates of free silver seem, as one of the papers points out, to have lost heart and enthusiasm.

—The discovery of a very extensive deposit of gold-bearing conglomerate at Indian River, Yukon, is the most interesting news that has come down from the North this year. Indian river is on the same side of the Yukon as the Klondike, and according to the maps of the Department of the Interior, it joins the main stream about 25 miles southeast of the mouth of the Klondike. The Colonist of Victoria remarks that an enormous deposit, such as is said to have been found, means the building of a big city in the far North.

—Mr. Bernier, the new Ottawa Minister, has publicly apologized for the sending of the contingents to South Africa. In a speech at Regard he said: "Personally, I should have preferred that the Government had sent no troops to Africa. But circumstances obliged Sir Wilfrid Laurier to act so. Nobody was obliged to go to Africa. Those only enlisted who wished to go. England asked us if anyone would like to enlist for South Africa war. All that the Government did was to pay the cost of sending the troops." It is made clear by Mr. Bernier that he is Tarteite for whom a good man has been shelved in British Columbia.

—Commenting upon the great increase of taxation and revenue under the Liberals the Montreal Star says: "Since 1896, the Liberal Government during four years, has received about twenty-four million dollars more revenue than it would have got had the yearly receipts remained at the figure of the average during the last ten years of Conservative rule, namely, about \$37,000,000. One might expect that with such rapidly swelling receipts, the Liberals would have been able to do something to reduce the national debt. On the contrary, the debt has kept rolling up by several millions annually until the year just ended, for which there appears to be a surety of a reduction. The promise is that for the year there may be a reduction of a million or so—which is all that can be effected with a revenue larger by twelve and half million dollars than in 1896, the last year of Conservative power."
