China Makes It Official, Mao Is Quitting One Job

By RONALD FARQUHAR PEIPING (Reuters) — Communist China Wednesday officially announced the decision of 65-year-old Mao Tse-tung to give up the post of chairman of the republic and to direct policy simply as party leader. A party communique said that after full and all-round consideration, the central committee had decided to approve Mao's decision not to run for re-election, a decision described as "a completely positive proposal" in the interests of the whole party and the people. Observers said the authorities appeared to have broken the news carefully and gently, taking pains to ensure that Mao's prestige was unharmed. Peiping newspapers remained silent during the last few days while the decision was reported being made known at meetings in offices, factories, universities and schools. Foreign diplomats were told Tuesday. PEOPLES FEAR DISPELLED Foreign Minister Chen Yi told the diplomats, according to usual reliable sources, that worry and fear was the people's first reaction to the news, but that this was dispelled by the explanation of Mao's future role. A majority of observers here agree that as long as Mao remains party chairman he is still the most powerful figure in the country. There are no concrete grounds for the view that he is on the way out. Speculation about Mao's successor centres around the names of Chu Teh, vice-chairman of the republic; Liu Shao Chi, regarded as No. 2 in the party hierarchy; and Chen Yun, a vice-premier and politician. Chen Yi, replying to allegations that policy failure lay behind Mao's decision, told diplomats last January that Mao informed India's ambassador of his intention to give up the chairmanship, and repeated it to Soviet Premier Khrushchev last August. GENERAL TOPICS Going on to general questions, the communique said: "The imperialist camp is rent by many internal contradictions... it is in process of gradual disintegration." Observers noted that the party's comments on the international situation omitted the current popular demand to "liberate" the offshore islands of Quemoy, Matsu and the Pescadores. "The only island referred to was Formosa, in a warning that if U.S. forces do not withdraw of their own accord, the day 'will eventually come' when the Chinese on the mainland and Formosa will 'unite to drive them out.'" Some observers also detected a milder note in the observations on the international situation generally.

New Main To Increase Water Supply And Help Firefighting

SUMMERSIDE — A release from Mayor W. A. Currie's office yesterday explained the plans for the water and sewerage installation that will service the new Hillcrest housing development in Summerside. The Mayor and Town Manager J. A. Brophy stated that one of the main considerations in drawing up the plan was that it will provide a 10-inch permieter water main which will not only increase the supply of water to householders out further add to the effectiveness of fire fighting in the town. The increase in water to homes will not only be to the homes in the housing project but to a large area of the east end of the town which is to be developed in future years. Also included in future planning was the decision to run the main along Arcona Street rather than Granville Street which eliminates laying extra line where adequate services already exist. A suggestion that the Hillcrest water and sewer service be connected to the Granville Street pipes would only allow connection with a six inch main which is now fed by four-inch mains and this was considered most inadequate. As well Hillcrest area lies below the end of the Granville Street sewer main and it would not be practicable to hook the pipes up in this manner.

It was only because of their constant work that the higher production per cow became a reality. "Only by weighing and testing can a farmer tell how his cows are doing. Only by such methods can improved production come about." Mr. Cullen congratulated A. MacRae and Sons on the showing they had made at the Royal Winter Fair. "No animal offered at the Sale of Stars had a better milk record than theirs," he said. Developing cattle that are pleasing to the eye is very important, but good production must also be considered, the provincial minister said. 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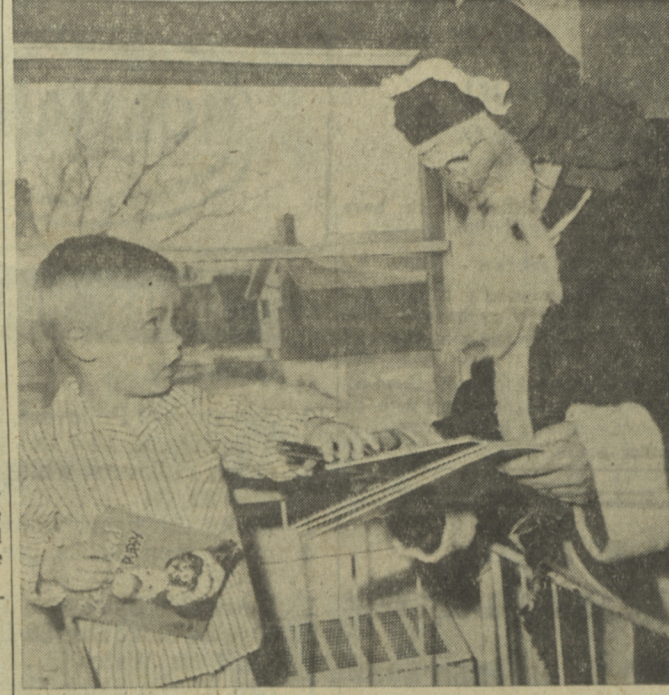

Pay Hikes Loom For Halifax Police, Firemen

HALIFAX (CP) — Pay increases for police and firemen have been recommended to city council. A safety committee meeting Tuesday recommended boosts which would advance the minimum pay for police constables and fire department hosenmen \$280 a year. This would raise minimum salaries for both categories to \$3,030. Police sergeants' and fire captains' pay raises under the new scale would be \$24 a year.

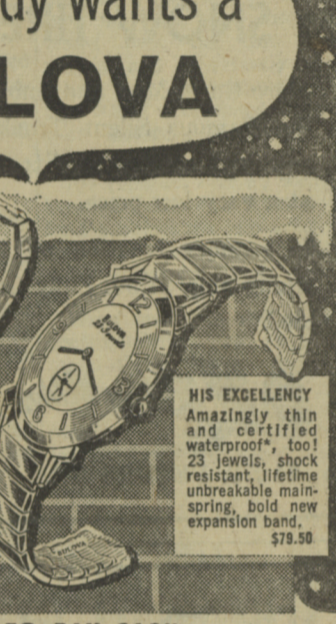
