

2 Ships Sink As Storms Rage On European Coasts

By ALVIN STEINKOFF LONDON (AP)—Storms raging on Europe's coasts have sunk two ships and have taken at least three lives. Gusts of wind up to 118 miles swept across the French Riviera and lashed the Ligurian sea off Italy Saturday and Sunday.

In Genoa, port officials estimated 25 per cent of the harbor's capacity knocked out by the continuing storm. They estimated damage at four billion lire (more than six million dollars). A 1,400-foot barge was battered in the main harbor breakwater and installations for docking tankers were destroyed. Genoa is Italy's biggest port.

Just off Britain's Essex coast, the Belgian trawler Denise Germain sank in the Thames estuary. The clacton lifeboat went out in the morning looking for survivors. First reports were that the vessel was picked up by a passing vessel, but two others were missing. The 10,072-ton New York tanker Camus Meadows, towed in for scrapping, went down at Genoa in Saturday's wild blow. There was no one aboard at the time.

ABANDONED VESSELS But the crews of the 4,147-ton Swedish motorship Nordanland and the Liberian Atlantic Lord were abandoned for a time.

The Nordanland was knocked against the pier and two holes torn in the hull. It started to sink and the 40-man crew abandoned the vessel. Then firemen started pumping water from the ship and kept it afloat.

Members of the crew of the Atlantic Lord were removed by breeches buoy when it was feared that the cargo of crude oil might catch fire. The crew returned to the ship Sunday.

The United States liner President Nationalist Planes Pound Red Shipping

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Nationalist planes sank a Red gunboat and "a considerable number" of wooden craft Sunday in the third straight day of air blows from Formosa, the defended island.

From dawn until nightfall, waves of planes pounded Red Chinese shipping around the Taisan harbor, 30 miles southwest of Nanchuan. The ministry said. Fortified Nanchuan is 140 miles north of Formosa.

Desperate Gunman Killed In N. Y. Tenement Battle

NEW YORK (AP)—August 10, his death. More than 200 policemen, many wearing bullet-proof vests and armed with tear gas and machine-guns, closed in on the building at 7 east 112th St. As thousands of spectators watched.

Two police officers were wounded by the 41-year-old pint-sized gunman, who eluded three police traps on Friday.

Robles had a police record dating back to the age of 14. Police believe he is responsible for the killing of Joseph Aronowitz, 40, who was found dead in a car in a deserted section of Brooklyn. Aronowitz had been scheduled for a robbery trial at Baltimore, Md.

Three detectives who want to pick up Robles at his apartment on Friday to question him in the Aronowitz slaying were forced to surrender their guns. Robles got the drop on them.

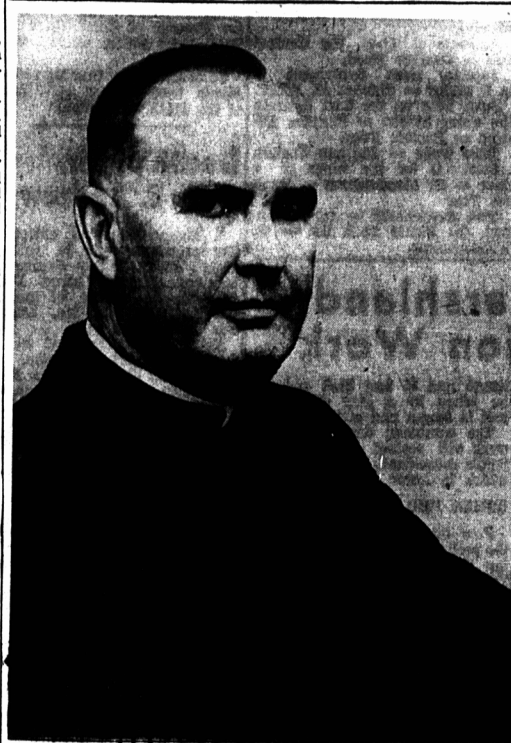
Armed with four guns—two of his own and two of the policemen—Robles then shot his way out of the apartment house and fled.

Later in the day, police apparently had him trapped in a Harlem housing project, but he managed to slip through a cordon thrown around the area.
