The Metropolitan.

The death of the aged and venerable Bishop of Fredericton, Metropolitan of the Province of Canada, announced on Saturday, removed from earth one of the grandest old men in America. Learning and piety, true genius and great experience were happily met in him. He had well-nigh completed his eighty-eighth year. In the whole British Empire there was not an older Bishop. He had filled the episcopal chair for upwards of forty-seven years. He came to New Brunswick in the year 1845. Since then his time and talents have been devoted to the Church of England in that Province and throughout Canada. Under his care the diocese of Fredericton prospered. There are now more than double as many churches and missions as there were when he entered upon his episcopal duties. An architect, he gave an immense impetus to elegant church building throughout his diocese. The beautiful Cathedral in Fredericton was designed by him and erected by his exertions. He was an excellent musician and musical composer, as well as an author and poet of marked ability. It is stated that his compositions are sung in the leading Anglican cathedrals and churches of England, as well as on this side of the Atlantic. His metrical translation of the book of Job has been accounted one of the best English versions of that ancient work. His numerous lectures and pamphlets were like brilliant jewels in plain setting. His words were short and Saxon and modest; but the thoughts which they conveyed were high. Many of his sermons and charges were published by his friends.

The Premiership.

SOME of the papers are agitated about the question of the Premiership. We think that Sir John Thompson has made it clear that, after Sir John Abbott, he is the man for the position. If Sir Charles Tupper were in Canada, and desired the office, he would, of course, obtain it. But Sir Charles is in England, and he does not want to be Premier. Under these circumstances, we agree with the Empire that if "the course of events should result in the voluntary relinquishment of the Premiership by the able and sagacious man who so worthily fills it, no serious-minded person questions who his successor must be. There is but one man seriously thought of for the place, and to him by common and willing consent will it be assigned. From no chance circumstances has it come about that the Liberal-Conservative party in the House of Commons have completely overborne their opponents, not merely in numerical preponderance, but in strength of debate, in wisdom of policy and in skillful tactics. They have been led in that house by one whose talents have challenged general admiration, and whose character, public and private, embodies those qualities of dignity, virtue and self-control found in the best types of Canadian manhood. Among those whose opinion is sought after his selection, if there was a vacancy in the Premiership, would be unanimous. Upon that point there can be no doubt, and, therefore, no room for speculation."

A New Enterprise.

We understand that a company has been formed on this island with the object of carrying on agricultural pursuits in the Northwest. When the Hon. Mr. Ferguson was out that way this summer, he saw that there was a good opening for such a company, and on his return home he laid a prospectus before a number of persons here, with a view of forming a joint stock company. The result was that a meeting was held in this city a few days ago, at which the company was formed. The President of the company is the Hon. D. Ferguson, and the principal directors are J. H. Haslam, Fred R. Perkins, and William S. Stewart, Secretary and Treasurer. We learn that Mr. Ferguson and Mr. Haslam will leave for the Northwest about the first of October for the purpose of acquiring the land and arranging for the commencement of farming operations next spring.

The Public Debt.

The Minister of Finance referred, at Petrolia, to opposition statements concerning the alleged increase of the public debt. He said: "The debt of the country in 1889, in round numbers, was \$237,000,000; in 1890 it was \$237,000,000; in 1891 it was \$237,000,000; in 1892 it was \$236,000,000. Where is the he heaping process?"

Notes and Comments.

The Minister of Finance was justified in saying, at Petrolia, that there "was no country on the face of the globe that had so much comfort in its widely extended homes, so much peace and actual prosperity, so much future strength of purpose and success in it as was the heritage of this people of Canada."

A Man Shot.

WAS IT THE RESULT OF RECKLESS SHOOTING OR AN ATTEMPT TO MURDER? While the cruiser Acadia was at Canoe, on Friday last, one of her crew was struck in the arm by a rifle bullet fired from the shore. When hit, he was in a boat coming ashore. He was taken to the hospital at Hawkesbury, where the doctors failed to find the bullet though a large ugly flesh wound appeared on the left arm, about half way between wrist and elbow. This is a serious matter which should be investigated.

Moncton's Missing Mayor.

ANOTHER CASE OF A MODEL MAN HAVING THE FULL CONFIDENCE OF THE PEOPLE. It is now some seven weeks since Mayor Snow disappeared from Moncton, and though some reports that he has been seen in Boston have been in circulation there is no reliable news of his whereabouts. Letters sent by friends to relatives reported to have seen him in different places have invariably brought unsatisfactory answers. In the meantime the facts in regard to his financial affairs have astonished everybody. In addition to the large amount, some \$14,000 or \$15,000, he had under discount on the banks, \$5,000, he owed to a relative, and the \$2,500 he owed the companies represented by him, he had borrowed money from many people, who had such implicit confidence in him that in most cases they held no surety at all. Some of these cases are particularly hard, especially those of women, who in some cases were induced to draw their ready money from the savings banks to loan to him at a higher rate of interest. The total of his liabilities will be very large, and he left no real estate or personal property of any account, having only been able to qualify for the mayoralty by having his property assessed beyond its value. As the business he carried on is estimated to have yielded an income of at least \$3,000 a year, and as the mayor neither drank, smoked nor gambled, had a very small family and always lived in a most inexpensive way, people are wondering how he came to be so far behind. Mr. Snow himself is the only person who can clear up the mystery, and if in the land of the living he does not seem to be disposed to come to the front.

Police Court.

This morning, Charles Slate, an old offender, was adjudged guilty of drunkenness on the 10th, and was fined \$30 or 90 days. Charlie said he would be out of the city by the 21st, if given a chance. His Honor said he would give him until that time to leave, but in the meantime he would have to go to jail. George Brown pleaded guilty to the larceny of a pair of boots from Richard C. Goff, on the 1st of June, and was remanded to jail until the 19th on another charge of larceny. When he comes up to answer the last mentioned charge he will be sentenced for the larceny of the boots. George's brother, Hugh Brown, was again remanded for eight days; and a wife-beating case was adjourned until to-morrow. A charge of obtaining money and goods under false pretences, preferred against James Rush by Robert Fennell, was adjourned until Wednesday. A number of dog-tax cases were disposed of, and the case of a man charged with trucking without license was adjourned to look up some law points.

MUST BE INSPECTED.

The self. Nellie Reid, Captain Reid, arrived from New York on Saturday evening. There being some little trouble over her coming up to the wharf, not having been inspected by the quarantine officer, that official telegraphed Ottawa for instructions as to what New York was an "infected port" under the meaning of the Act. This afternoon, at half-past three, he received a reply to the effect that all vessels from New York must be inspected, and if free from disease they must not be detained.

THE COBAN.

The steamer Coban, Captain Robert Fraser, arrived here from Montreal this morning at nine o'clock, with a general cargo and Mr. McCaw and wife and Mr. Katig and Harbor Guard early this afternoon with a miscellaneous cargo and four passengers, viz., Mrs. Oakes, Mrs. Finneaux, Miss Finneaux and Patrick Power.

GOOD FISHING.

The schooner Tartar, of Lunenburg, (whose captain has been seriously ill at Souris for two or three weeks past) went out to the fishing grounds off East Point on Monday last and returned on Saturday evening to Souris, the first mate in charge. During that time he has captured 70 quintals of prime cod fish. She has now on board, as the result of the last three months' fishing, about 700 quintals in all.

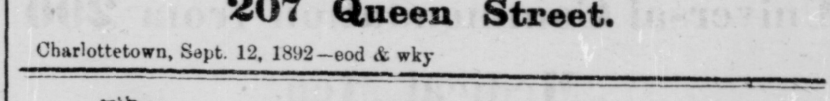

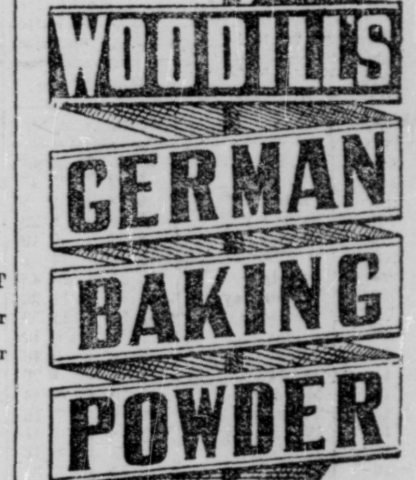
