NEW POST OFFICE.—A new Post Office will soon be opened at Gowan Brae, head of Souris River. Mr. Lazarus White has been appointed Postmaster. The petition asking for this office was forwarded only a few days ago to Mr. A. C. McDonald, through whose recommendation it has been granted.

CAPT. RODERICK CAMERON, for many years master of the Princess of Wales, will this year command the St. Lawrence in the place of Capt. Evans, who has retired. Capt. Allan Cameron, who commanded the last steamer

Summerside last year, takes charge of the Princess of Wales. Some other changes are being talked of, but no decision has yet been arrived at.

The system works so thoroughly that the complaints do not average one for every 200,000 plugs turned out.

A Bishop Murdered.

MADRID, April 18. At 10.30 this morning, while the Bishop of Madrid was ascending the steps of the cathedral he was shot with a revolver by a priest. After firing three shots, the priest was seized, thus putting a stop to his murderous work. His victim was carried to the private chamber in the cathedral, where the last sacrament for the dying were administered to him. The motive for the crime was revenge, as the man who fired the shots was recently dismissed from the priesthood, and had fruitlessly applied to the Bishop to be reinstated.

Gladstone's Scheme Denounced.

DUBLIN, April 18. At a meeting of tenant farmers at Kildyston to-day, the land purchase bill was denounced as simply a measure for the relief of landlords. It was declared that if the farmers got their holdings on the basis of four years' rental their position would be very little improved, as they are without the necessary capital with which to obtain a start. A resolution was adopted, asking the Parnellite members of Parliament to oppose the Bill.

A Ruthless Canard.

TORONTO, April 18. Great excitement was created here yesterday morning, by the News publishing five columns of a despatch from Ottawa, purporting to be the farewell address of Sir John A. Macdonald, announcing his retirement into private life. On comparing the address with that of President George Washington of 1796 it was found that the two were identical Canada being substituted for America.

Betting on the Result.

LONDON, April 18. The World's correspondent says "there is a good deal of betting among members of the House as to the probable result of the division on the second reading of the Home Rule Bill. Henry Labouchere has laid Lord Randolph Churchill an even 100 pounds that the bill will pass the second reading, and betting is generally even."

Danger Averted.

MONTREAL, April 18. A special immigrant train which arrived here, this afternoon, had a narrow escape when about half a mile from this station. It had just crossed a bridge when the rails expanded. Had the cars left the track a frightful accident must have occurred. There were five or six hundred persons in the train.

Devastating Flames.

VIENNA, April 18. The town of Stry, in Galicia, has been almost completely destroyed by fire. Quite a number of people were killed.

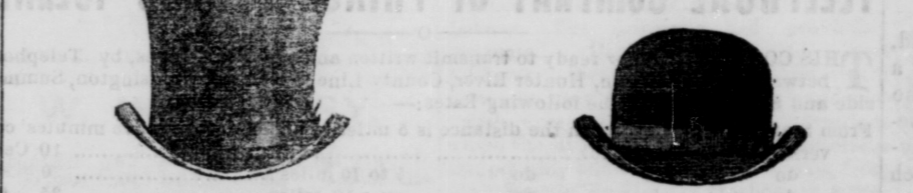

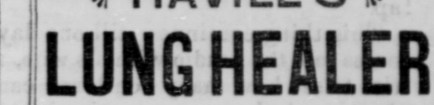
