## Warwick And Balbo Emerge Top Men In Mat Card At The Forum

Leo Warwick, Pacific Coast champion, and Sal Balbo were the winners of last night's wrestling card at the Forum that produced plenty of action and clever maneuvering.

Matched against Angelo Savoldi of Hoboken, New Jersey, Warwick made his debut in Charlottetown with an aggressive performance to take his opponent, also a newcomer to local fans, in straight falls.

In a rousing match with wild Bull Montana, Balbo, the idol of Charlottetown mat fans, took the first and third falls for a clean-cut decision over the rugged and tough Montana.

In the opening bout on the card, Warwick lived up to his top billing when he pulled some lightning-fast wrestling to pin his man with a scissors hold in the short space of four minutes and 58 seconds.

Savoldi, slippery as an eel and quick as a cat, made the going tougher for his bigger opponent in the second fall and really had Warwick in trouble with continual applications of tearing leg and arm holds but lost the fall and the match at the 29:58 mark.

Warned repeatedly by referee Leo Lamoureux for using illegal tactics, he was finally disqualified and the bout awarded to Warwick, the latter having one leg so badly wrenched and mauled that he had to be assisted by attendants to his dressing room.

After twenty-two minutes and fourteen seconds of bristling action in the first fall of the second match, Balbo won the verdict when he rendered Montana helpless with a pressure leg-hold that forced him to quit.

The bout scheduled as a "fight to a finish" with no time limit, took a sharp turn in the second fall when Montana hit Balbo with everything but the ring posts and finally tied him up with the same hold that lost him the first fall, to force Balbo to quit at 39:02 and send him limping out of the ring.

Balbo, however, came roaring back in the final fall when he really opened up on Montana after the latter tried to go to work on the injured leg, and after some rough and ready action, pinned Montana at 58:46 with a lightning-fast, reverse Nelson. Just before the bout ended, Montana had his opponent tied up solid with a full Nelson, but Balbo, with expert maneuvering, upset the applicant and Montana too, when he flipped over to apply the reverse Nelson and pin his man solid on the canvas.

## Junior Poultry Club Makes Tour

The first of a series of Junior Poultry Club tours was conducted on Wednesday last, under the auspices of the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture.

The first club taking part was Morell Junior Boys and Girls Club, comprised of 18 members. The tour was conducted by Messrs. H. M. MacLean, poultry fieldman with the Provincial Department and E. A. Holland, poultry inspector, Dominion Department of Agriculture.

The first call was at Morell Co-operative Egg Grading Station where the grading of eggs was fully explained by Mr. Holland. From here, the group drove into the Experimental Farm where Mr. Frank Tinney explained in detail the construction of the large new round hen house that has just been completed, also the automatic feeders and watering system.

Mr. Lorne Ramsay of the Experimental Station also explained R.O.P. and hatchery work. These talks were very interesting and educational and the Club gained excellent information on methods of feeding, housing and R.O.P. work.

The next call was at Ralph Raynor's Mount Herbert, where Mr. Raynor spent considerable time explaining to the Club R.O.P. breeding, ranging of poultry, tramping, feeding and management. Club members were treated to soft drinks by Mr. and Mrs. Raynor.

The members then proceeded to Canada Packers Abattoir here where, through the courtesy of the management, Mr. Robertson conducted a tour of the plant.

From here the Club went to the poultry processing and packing plant where Mr. Boudreau of Canada Packers conducted a tour of this branch of the packing industry, explaining in detail the processing and packing of poultry. The Club members were then conducted to the Island Chick Hatchery where Miss Isabel MacDonald explained the business part of hatchery operations and Mr. Angus Milligan hatchery operator in full. Here again, the members were treated to refreshments.

Members were then returned to their homes in Morell, having completed a most interesting and educational tour.

## Return From Ill Fated Mennonite Trek

**HAGUE, Sask., Aug. 7—(CP)—**Two children who were on the ill-fated Mennonite trek to Honduras which returned last week died during the week-end, possibly from effects of the trip.  
 Harry Fenner, nine months, and Annie Friesen, 18 months, died from inflammation of the intestines.

Several other children who returned to Hague from the trip are reported seriously ill.  
 The party suffered severe hardship through the journey and children became sick from changes in drinking water and from poor food.

Twenty-five Mennonites returned to Hague last Tuesday after a two-month attempt to reach Honduras in Central America, where they had hoped to settle.  
 Originally, 62 Mennonites left Hague in May by motor caravan. They were turned back by Mexican authorities in Mexico City, travelled to Texas and then to New Orleans. There they split up, 37 remaining and 25 returned to Saskatchewan.

## Indians Within Half Game Of Yankees In League Race

The Cleveland Indians, behind splendid pitching of husky Mike Garcia, advanced to within a half game of the pace-setting New York Yankees in the American League pennant race Tuesday night.

Garcia turned back St. Louis Browns, 5-1, on four hits and three runs on a game with a three-run homer in the sixth inning. The Yanks were not scheduled.

In other American League games, Philadelphia Athletics downed third place Boston Red Sox, 7-4, and Chicago White Sox nipped the Detroit Tigers, 2-1, in 13 innings. The Red Sox now trail the Yanks by 4½ games and the fourth place White Sox lag 6½ games behind.

Garcia yielded only two scratch singles until the ninth when the Browns scored on a single, double and ground out. Rookie Jim McDonald went the distance for St. Louis and was tagged for 10 hits.

The Red Sox blew a 4-1 lead in bowing to the A's. The A's surged ahead 5-4, with a pair of runs in the sixth on triples by Elmer Valo and Hank Majeski and a single by Wally Moses. The A's clinched it with single runs in the eighth and ninth. Bob Hooper went the route for the A's, scattering nine hits, Bobby Deer drove in all of Boston's runs with a pair of doubles.

Lefty Billy Pierce went all the way for the White Sox in their marathon victory over Detroit. Rookie Jim Busby singled home Eddie Robinson from second base

with the winning run in the 13th. Robinson accounted for Chicago's first run with his 20th homer in the second inning. Bob Cain, who took from starter Ted Gray in the 13th, was the loser.

## Gambler Blown To Bits By Bomb

**DALLAS, Aug. 7—(AP)—**Herbert Noble was blown to bits today.  
 The 58-year-old gambler, survivor of un-numbered attempts on his life, was killed by a bomb in front of his North Texas ranch home. Parts of his body were said to have been found 100 feet from the point of the explosion.

Some reports said a bomb was placed in his mailbox. Others said the bomb was in his car and that the car was blown to bits. The last recorded attempt to kill Noble occurred last March. Jellied nitroglycerine was found in two cylinders of the engine of his private plane.

Six days before that, Noble had walked away from what was apparently the 10th attempt on his life. Explosives—again believed to be a nitroglycerine bomb—blew up the engine of his plane as he switched on the ignition. A plate steel wall between the engine and cockpit saved his life.

A few days later, Dallas District Attorney Henry Wade declared a reward of \$10,000 had been offered in underworld circles for assassination of Noble. But Wade also said he believed Noble engineered some of the attempts on his life for publicity purposes.

One bomb apparently intended for Noble killed his wife instead last year. She stepped on the starter of Noble's car and the vehicle exploded.  
 Noble also has been shot at in his bullet-proof car, wounded as he stood on the front porch, narrowly missed by a rifle bullet which came through his hospital room window, and ambushed on lonely country roads.

## Canadians Send Aid To Children In Many Regions

**TORONTO, August 7—(CP)—**In Ontario, Italian babies can receive medical attention at a clinic built and equipped with Canadian money. In every village in Carinthia, Austria, children are wearing Canadian clothing, and in Lebanon and Syria, Canadian supplies are the main support of child welfare clinics.

All this is the work of the Canadian Save The Children Fund. At a recent meeting the national executive of the fund approved a budget of \$25,000 worth of food and clothing, shoes, blankets and baby powder for needy children in Italy, Greece, Austria, Syria and Lebanon. The shipment will include \$3,000 worth of boys' trousers and \$10,000 worth of shoes.

Mrs. R. E. Tanner, Executive Secretary, who has just returned from a visit to other Save The Children Funds in Europe and the Middle East, says that the character of overseas work is changing. Such funds are concentrating more on helping to raise the standard of child welfare and to give support to projects of lasting value in the countries being helped.

In Greece the government has asked the British Save The Children Fund to open and supervise a training college for nursery school teachers. In Italy the Save The Children Fund has been asked to take charge of a preventative home near Rome and in addition, is hoping to build a Child Welfare Clinic.

Mrs. Tanner says the aim of the funds is to help the people of needy countries to help themselves.

## Channel Swimmer Little Known Now

**NEW YORK, Aug. 6—(AP)—**Twenty-five years ago Monday, Gertrude Ederle became the first woman to swim the English Channel.

She came home to a Broadway ticker-tape parade and the cheers of hundreds of thousands.

Miss Ederle said laughingly today that she usually goes unrecognized now when she swims at local pools and beaches.

## Two Mobsters Are Slain In Hollywood

**HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 7—(AP)—**The dog-eat-dog law of the underworld has been enforced again with the expert slaying of two mobsters. And police, as is usual in such killings, are faced with an almost clueless case.

The latest eruption of gangland warfare in Southern California came last night when Tony Brancato, 36, and Tony Trombino, 31, were rubbed out with efficiency and dispatch.

They were found slumped in a parked car on a quiet Hollywood street. Trombino was killed by two shots in the back of the head and a third in the shoulder. Brancato, beside him in the front seat of the sedan, was slain by one shot in the back of the head.

Apparently they were blasted by a "bullet" seated in the back of the car or by someone hiding in the back. The murder weapon has not been located and so far no one has been found who saw the killer.

Both were well-known underworld figures here and in Kansas City.

It was prophesied last July that Brancato was a marked man when he appeared in
