It is hoped to have two guest speakers to speak on the physical and spiritual aspects of sex.

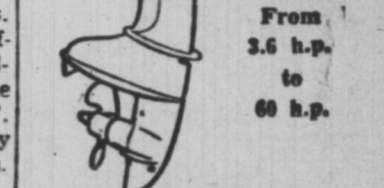

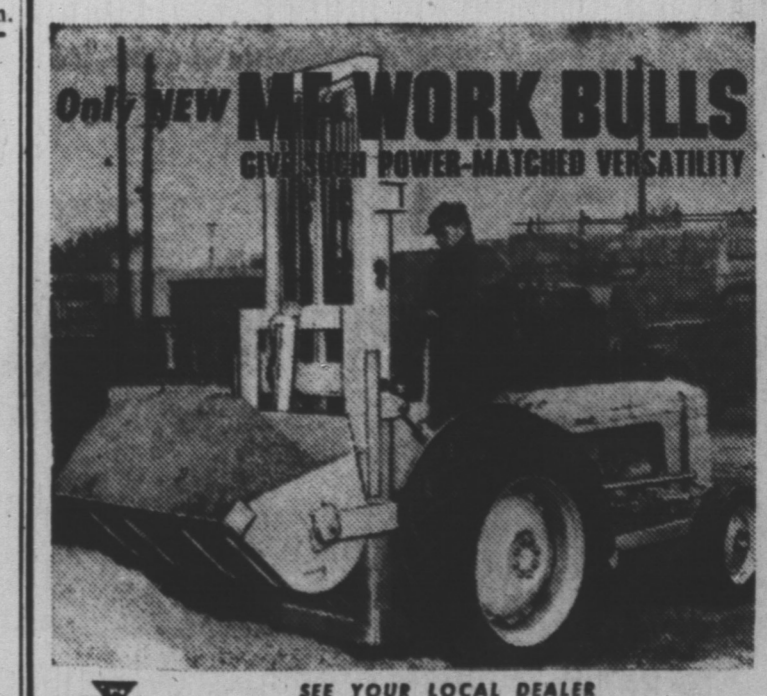

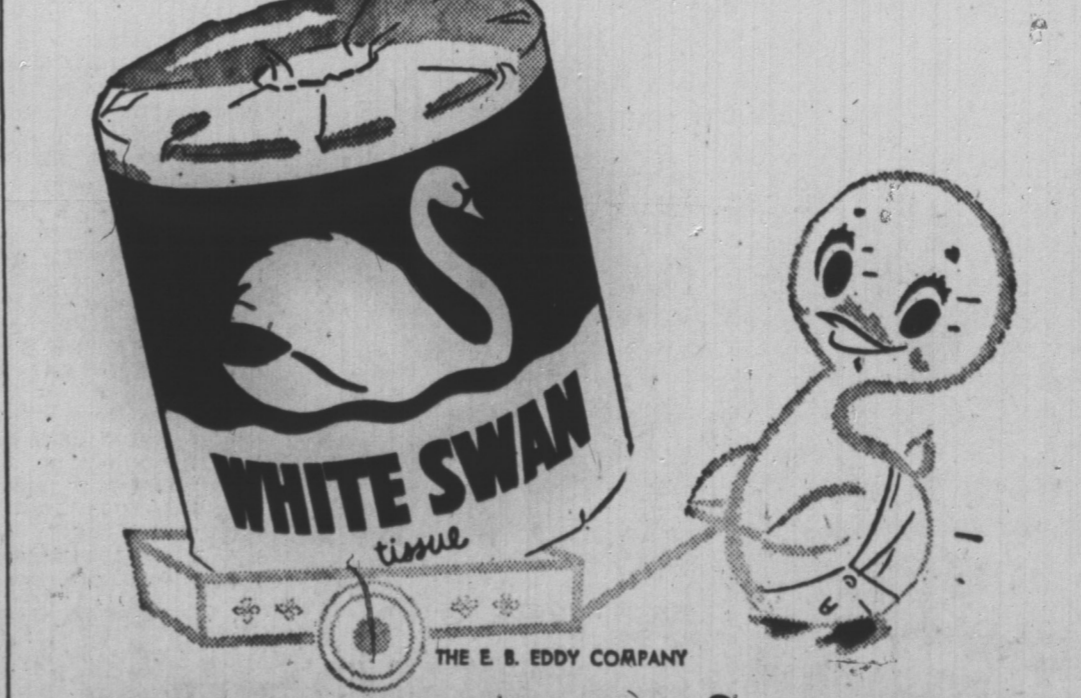
