SILENCE OF THE WAR OFFICE

Regarding Buller's Movements.

GEN. MACDONALD HOLDS THE TOP OF A HILL.

The British Troops in South Africa

Under Secretary makes a Further Statement—There will be 194,000 British Troops in Africa Exclusive of Sick and Wounded.

SPECIAL DESPATCH TO THE EXAMINER.

NO NEWS.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—4 a. m.—Little fresh information is published this morning with regard to Buller's advance.

According to one correspondent the British infantry continued to move forward on Wednesday; while, according to another, no progress has been made since Tuesday.

In all probability if the position captured at Vaal Krantz is really important General Buller had plenty of work to do on Wednesday in maintaining his ground, and he was doubtless mainly occupied on that day in bringing up more troops and big guns.

As to yesterday's operations nothing whatever is published.

The most remarkable thing about the movement is the silence of the War Office.

No official despatch from General Buller has been issued to the public, although naturally more than one has been received by the War Office authorities, and the British general's situation is consequently unknown outside of Pall Mall.

There cannot be any doubt however that to effectually relieve General White, Buller must inflict a decisive defeat on the Boers.

It would be disastrous to cut his way through the Burgheer army and march on Ladysmith leaving Boers undestroyed on his flank.

AT MODDE RIVER.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—General McDonald, by his reconnaissance to Koolesburg, seems to have only succeeded in drawing a number of Boers outward from the Magersfontein trenches.

He holds the top of a hill; but he cannot get his artillery into action against the Boers, who are on the other side.

The latest news regarding General Roberts is to the effect that he left Cape Town on Tuesday night for the north, accompanied by his staff and body guard.

NO KNOWLEDGE.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—Referring to the report that three Canadians in South Africa were court-martialled for sleeping on sentry duty, Dr. Borden says that he has no knowledge of the penalty being imposed, but he cannot conceive the extreme penalty could be carried out in the case of volunteers.

The grand total of British troops in South Africa, he added, would be 194,000 effective, exclusive of sick and wounded.

A BOER REPORT.

BOER HEAD QUARTERS, Ladysmith, Feb. 8.—The British who were in possession of kopje at Molens drift have abandoned it after bombardment by Boer cannon this morning and retired across Tugela river to their former position.

A desultory cannonade is proceeding at Tugela this morning, but otherwise everything is quiet.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—A report that Ladysmith has been relieved is again current. But the War Office authorities say that they have no confirmation of the report.

ESCANABA, Mich., Feb. 9.—A Chicago and Northwestern passenger train, known as the Filch Mountain Accommodation, which runs between this city and the Metropolitan Station, was wrecked in the rear end by collision with a freight train at Ford River switch, at 6.30 o'clock last night.

Nine passengers were killed; three are reported missing; while five are seriously and four slightly injured.
