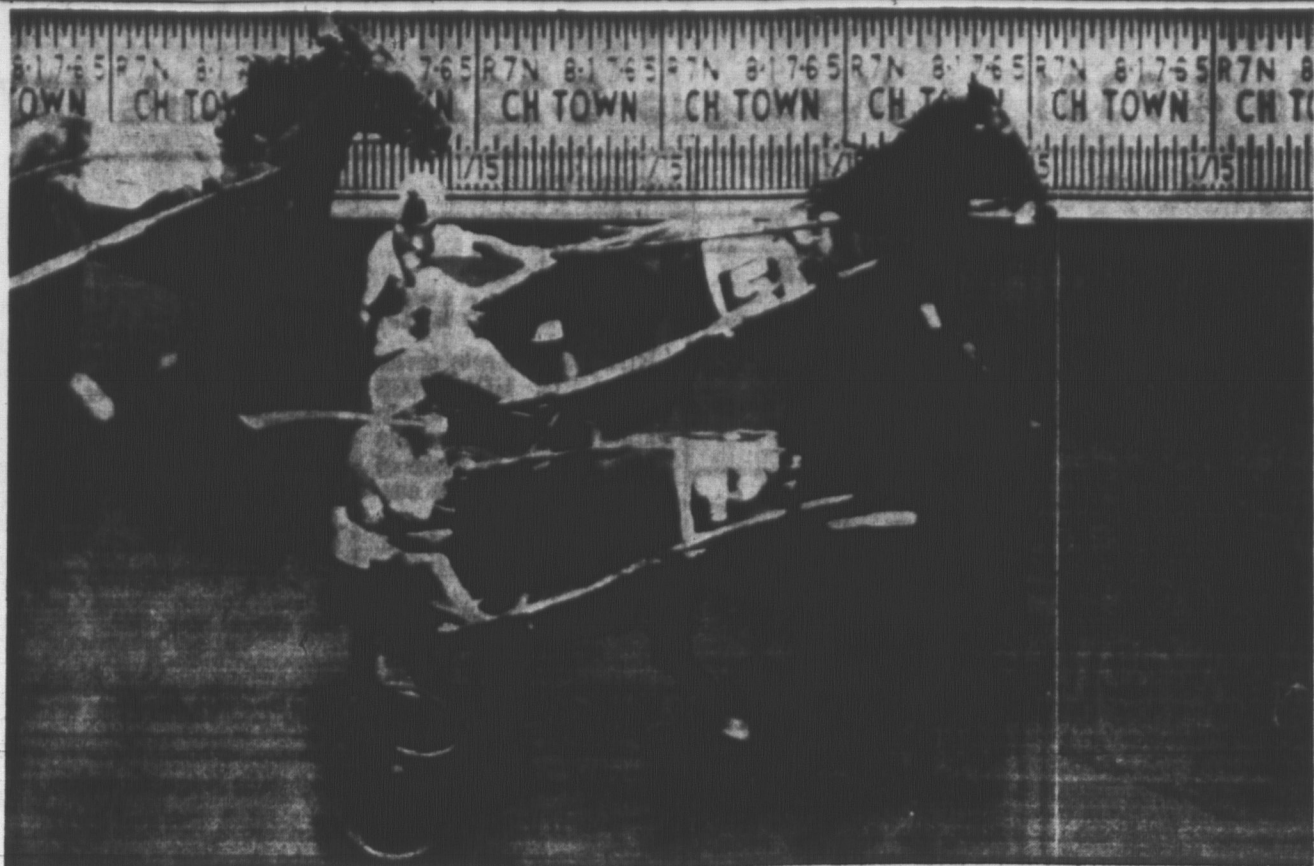

TV Coverage Is Announced

TORONTO (CP)—Thirty-four Canadian Football League games will be televised this season, 14 on a national basis, 11 on Eastern Canada networks and nine in the West.

Only interlocking east-west games are to be televised nationally, according to the schedule released Monday.

The privately-owned Canadian Television Company will carry 10 of the games on its national network, starting with the Aug. 29 meeting in Vancouver between Toronto Argonauts and British Columbia Lions.

The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will handle the remaining four games on a national basis. As in past, the networks will black out games within a 75-mile radius of the home stadium.
