TRIPLE DROWNING.—Word has been received at Ottawa of a bad accident on Amable Duford river, in Calvin Township, by which the daughters of Thomas Walls, aged 17, 12 and 3 years, respectively, lost their lives. The youngest slipped off a boom and her elder sisters were drowned in attempting to save the little one.

TELEGRAPHERS' WAGES.—A committee representing the telegraphers employed on the Island railway waited upon Mr. Sharp yesterday, and submitted their claim for a more equitable scale of wages. The claim is similar to the one made a few days before upon the General Manager at Moncton. It is hoped that good results will follow.

TESTING NEW ENGINES.—Yesterday afternoon one of the new engines imported for the Island railway was taken out for a trial trip. In the vicinity of Hunter River, however, something went wrong with a tube in the boiler and she had to be towed in by an engine sent out from town. The other new engine was tested the previous day.

THE BLACK MAN'S BURDEN.—At Wednesday's session of the colored Baptist congress of the United States, at Atlanta City, N. J., Rev. Dr. Robinson, of Pittsburg, in an address, declared that the colored race "must paddle its own canoe. We must get money, banks, railroads," he continued, "learn how to make guns and powder, etc., and then learn to use them before we can become a power in this country."
