GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. London August 8.—The government has instructed the naval commander in Chilean waters to enforce if necessary, Great Britain's demands looking to the protection of British subjects throughout China and the prompt punishment of all who were implicated in the recent massacres.

St. John's, Nfld., August 8.—News of the Labrador cod fishery is most encouraging. Intelligence just received by a vessel just arrived indicated the best fishery in many years. It will bring from more northern portions. Business people are much encouraged at the prospects.

HALIFAX, Aug 8.—The Maritime Y. M. C. A. Convention opened today with prayer services. The officers elected were: Capt. Masters; Motion, President; Vice President, J. C. Macintosh, Halifax; Dr. Barbour, Fredericton; J. A. Goulay, Yarmouth; A. McLeod, Kentville; Secretary, John Hay, Truro; Assistant, J. A. Crowe, Chatham.

LONDON, August 8.—The Court of Appeals has dismissed Countess Russell's appeal against the judgment of April last, by which she was ordered to pay £10,000 to her husband for maintenance.

The City Council of Russell, Kan., has passed an ordinance imposing a tax of \$100 for the sale of cigars or cigarette paper.

Foreign papers said that Professor Leyden, the famous German physician, received \$25,000 for attending the late Czar in his last illness.

A newspaper has just been started in London which is printed on a postal card. The first number has four illustrations, a comic tragedy, a few jokes and puzzles and some advertisements.

Montana's new code kills the oleomargarine business by taxing that product ten cents a pound. The State last year derived a revenue of \$5,000 from the oleomargarine tax, which is now null.

It is said that there are in the State of Kansas twenty well-built towns without a single inhabitant, and that Saratoga, in that State, now absolutely uninhabited, has among other buildings a \$30,000 theatre.

A fashionable tailor, who makes garments for those who can afford to pay his price, predicts that the running of knickerbockers will become a thing of the past, and that the old custom of wearing knee breeches.

The Berlin gold beater at the Paris Exposition showed gold leaves so thin that it would require 25,000 to produce the thickness of a single leaf, yet each leaf was so perfect and free from holes as to be impervious to the strongest electric light.

A Belgian inventor has devised an immense sump, such as has probably never been seen before. It is composed of 3,000 pieces, six feet high, and measures 110 feet in diameter. It is fed with lard oil, and the consumption is said to be very small.

A practical invention has been introduced in a Berlin restaurant, where the clothes hooks are arranged in such a way that, after hanging a coat on them, they can be locked by means of a snap lock. In the upper hook, the respective number of the coat is written, and the regular guests receive a key, while transient visitors have to ask a waiter to return their overcoats.

Granite is quarried in Bangalore, in Southern India, by burning a waste of stone and seven feet long over the surface of the flat rocks, and keeping this continually moving forward. To such perfection has this method been brought that in less than a day about 70 square feet may be split up, burning wood at the small rate of one pound to 30 pounds of stone quarried.
