One hundred pairs of roller skates have been imported, which will be lent free for a week, with free use of Rink to those who patronize it. The flooring was manufactured at the Steam Mills of Theoph. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

News from the Capital.

OTTAWA, Dec. 22.

Nearly all of the Cabinet Ministers have returned to the capital, except those who will spend their Christmas West.

A telegram from Lord Derby announces that John Hops, a Caughnawaga Indian on the Nile Expedition, became insane and will be transported to a military hospital, at Naley, England.

A Winnipeg special announces that the anthracite coal discovered at Crowfoot Crossing is equal to the best Pennsylvania product. This is the first anthracite coal discovered in Manitoba.

The French Budget.

PARIS, Dec. 22.

M. Tierard, Minister of Finance, presented the Budget in the Senate to-day. M. Coleman, in behalf of the Finance Committee, denounced the delay in the introduction of the Budget, saying that should it prove necessary to vote the Budget in provisional twelfths, the country would know that the Senate was not answerable for it.

Run Down at Sea.

NEW LONDON, CONN., Dec. 22.

The schooner which was run down by the steamer Bristol, in the race on Sunday morning, and subsequently towed into this port, proves to be the Zamora, of St. John, N. B. Capt. W. A. Finlay, from Alma for New York with laths. The captain and crew spent the night on Fisher's Island, and reached here to-day.

Shipping Disaster.

GLoucester, Mass., Dec. 22.

The schooner B. Hildegarde, which left here for the shore fishing three weeks ago, struck a reef off Cutler, Me., during a blinding snow-storm, last Monday morning. The vessel is a total loss. The crew took to the boats and found safe harbor at Cutler, where, it is said, not much hospitality was shown by the inhabitants.

More Wrecks.

BIDFORD, ME., Dec. 22.

A schooner of about 100 tons, loaded with slabs, supposed to be an English vessel, name unknown, went ashore on Beach Island last night and is a total wreck. She lies broken up, with a portion of the rigging and spars clinging to her. The crew are supposed to be lost.

Miners on a Strike.

PITTSBURG, Pa. 22.

The coal miners all along the Monongahela river, went on a strike this morning, for an advance of one half cent per bushel, in the price of mining. Nearly four thousand men quit work. Rather than concede the advance the sets will close down indefinitely.

Warlike at the Cape.

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 22.

A large number of armed Boers are leaving the Transvaal for the border. The President is unable to prevent their departure.

Ordination.

FREDERICTON, Dec. 22.

At the 11 a. m. service at the Cathedral, yesterday, Rev. Mr. Lounds of the parish of Prince William, was ordained priest.

The Cotton Crop.

BOMBAY, Dec. 22.

Heavy rain storms are damaging the cotton crop.
